## JASON GANT,

called as a witness, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

EXAMINATION BY MR. SANDVEN:
Q Name, please.
A Jason Gant.
Q Do you -- can you hand Exhibit 129 to him, please.
129.

Q Yep. Are you familiar with this document, sir, that's
titled State Governments' Use of Help America Vote Act funds, '07?

A Yes.
Q Can you go to Page 4, please.
Uh-huh.
Q All right. How much leftover money did South Dakota have from HAVA funds in 2007?

A Total funds. Balance, 11.5 million.

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All right. What are the different categories of funds? Is it Section 101 and Section 251 funds that come down under HAVA?

A I believe those are the numbers. Or is it Title I?

Yeah. There is Title I, Title II, and there might be a Title III.

Q All right. So your understanding here today, how many different categories of HAVA funds are there? And if you don't know, you don't know.
I don't know.
Do you know of any of the categories of funds under HAVA?
I know there are state funds, and then there are county
funds that we have here in the state.
State funds and common funds?
County.
County funds. All right. Do you know what category, what Title, if it's Title -- or what section number one of those goes for?

No.
Do you know if state funds can be spent on early voting?
All HAVA funds can only be spent based off of two things; the State of South Dakota HAVA plan and then the federal HAVA Act.

Q All right. So my question is on what we just talked

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    \$6 million, to spend.
    A I don't know exactly what the $\$ 6$ million was spent on
Q Do you know anything that HAVA funds would be spent on
during an off-election year?
A I believe these monies from -- that were spent in '07--
I remember when HAVA started, one of the biggest
expenditures the state had was the AutomARKs.
Q What is that?
A It's a machine that helps voters who have disabilities.
If they are blind or have other disabilities, it's a
touch screen where they touch the voter that -- or the
candidate that they want to vote for, and then it prints
out their platform.
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about on Page 4, there was a $\$ 11,550,925$ left over.
Could any of that money have been spent on early voting in Shannon County?
A Absentee voting -- yes, it's all based off of the HAVA plan and the HAVA Act.
Q Right. My question is, though, there are certain things that HAVA is allocated for, right?

Yes.
Technological aids, for instance, correct?
Yes.
All right. Are there any restrictions on any of that money that was left over in 2007 being spent on early voting in Shannon County?
Yes. There are restrictions to that.
Q Which money cannot be spent in Shannon County for early voting?
A That's not what I said. All of this $\$ 11$ million back in '07 could only be spent if it qualified under the HAVA plan or the HAVA Act.
Q All right. There's two HAVA plans that have been in effect, one in 2005 and one in 2010?
A No. I believe there was an '06 and an '08. The state is required to submit a new HAVA state plan every time there is additional federal funding.
Q All right. So it's your testimony there is how many HAVA
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it to the extent that we have established a task force and began that procedure. We have just began internal discussions about the possibility.
Q All right. Do you remember the chief judge asking you some questions when you were on the stand at the preliminary hearing in this matter?
A Uh-huh.
Q All right. Do you remember -- do you remember stating that you were drafting one for 2012?
A I don't. I remember she asked how many -- what the dollar amount was, and that was around 9 million.
Q Don't remember saying that you were working on an election plan in 2012?
No. I don't.
Okay. So there was $\$ 11,550,925$ left over in 2007 .
Yes.
All right. And you don't know what portion of that money could be allocated to Shannon County?
A All the dollars could be allocated to any county in the state based off the HAVA plan and the HAVA Act.
Q Right. Are you aware of any restrictions on any HAVA funding to Shannon County for absentee or early voting?
A The only restrictions for all counties in the state is the HAVA plan and the HAVA Act.
Q Right. Which restrictions are there in the HAVA plan or

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## dollars available.

Q So there was no new HAVA plan in 2011?
No.
Okay. How about '10?
There is a new -- there was a HAVA plan -- a 2010 HAVA
plan.
Q Do you know what the distribution was from the federal
government for HAVA funding to the State of South Dakota in 2010?
I don't remember.
Do you have any idea what it was? Was it over a million?
I would purely be guessing. Half a million. And I'm
sure it's in the 2010 HAVA state plan if you have that.
I would guess that it's -- part of it's in there.
Q All right. So how many HAVA plans have there been since
you have been South Dakota Secretary of State?
A Zero.
Q And you are working on your first one right now?
A Well, 2000 -- to be eligible for that 6,000 bucks, we need to file a 2012 version.
Q All right. And you were seated when?
A January of 2011.
Q All right. So no HAVA plan in '11, and you're working on your first one now in '12?
A To say we are working on it is -- we are not working on
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HAVA Act?
A That money can only be spent based off what is in the plan and what is in the act.
Q Here's my question. And we will be here a while on this if you don't want to answer. But if -- if you want to go -- is there any restriction on any HAVA money, that you are aware of here today, being spent for absentee voting in Shannon County?
A I don't know how that is different than what $I$ just said regarding -- Shannon County has the same restrictions as any other county in the state. Shannon County isn't special with this $\$ 11$ million.
Q Does any county have any restrictions on whether any HAVA money is spent on early voting?
A Every county has the same restrictions; that it must follow the plan and it must follow the act.
Q Right. Are you aware here today of any restrictions in the plan of HAVA money being spent on early voting?
I guess I'm not understanding the differences here.
Are there any restrictions in the plan on HAVA funds being spent on early voting, in the current plan?
I don't believe so.
You don't know of any?
I would have to look through the plan again or -- and the act, but I mean there are -- there's a set criteria of

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whatever it was, $X$ dollars was needed.
Q Do you remember, did you have a discussion with anybody?
A About that amount?
Q About the cost of early voting, absentee voting, at a
physical location in Shannon County.
A No. We discussed the money and that Shannon County was
needing additional money to have the 46 days.
Q Who did you have that discussion with?
A I suppose staff.
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Which staff?
A When we received the letter, of course discussed it, and then wrote the response that we would give the -whatever the dollar amount was that we put in the letter as an additional allowable reimbursable amount.

Q But before March 1st, 2012, had you ever had a conversation with anyone regarding the costs of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County?
A No. I don't think so.
Not that you recall?
No.
Never had a single conversation with anybody regarding
the costs of early voting in Shannon County? That's a
no?
I don't remember.
Not that you can remember?
No.
All right. The -- when did you first learn that folks in Shannon County didn't have the same number of days of early voting that people did in other counties at a
physical location located within the county?
A I remember the press story from 2000 -- was it the end of 2011, that talked about where the Shannon County Commission had approved six days or something.
Q Why didn't you intervene then?
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14 charge of their election.
Q Was that the first time you learned that Shannon County folks didn't have the same number of days of early voting as people -- at a physical location in the county as people in other counties, was 2011?
A I don't remember about the physical location issue, but I do remember during the 2010 when I was running or campaigning for Secretary of State, that there were issues in Shannon County.

Yet you were a statewide candidate in 2010?
Yes.
And that's when you first learned that Shannon County
voters didn't have the same number of days of early
voting in their respective county?
That was the first time I paid attention to it.
Where did you learn that from?
Probably a newspaper or TV or something.
Do you remember when you were campaigning in 2010 and learned that?
No.
Do you know if it was in the first half of 2010?
I don't remember.
Did you know that Shannon County residents had to drive to Hot Springs to cast an in-person ballot?

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A I don't remember.
Q You don't remember?
A Knowing that they had to drive to Hot Springs, I don't remember that.

Q Do you remember getting asked the question by me at the preliminary injunction hearing, "And you knew there wasn't equal access to voting at that time?" Do you remember getting asked that question?
I remember that --
Q Do you remember it; yes or no?
Yes.
Q And do you remember answering, "I knew that Shannon County residents had to drive to Hot Springs to cast an in-person ballot"? Do you remember saying that?
A I don't. I mean I -- I know now that they have to drive.
I don't remember --
Q Can you look at Page 134 of the transcript.
A (Witness complies.)
Q Do you remember going under oath at the hearing?
Yes.
Q Now do you remember getting asked, "And you knew there
wasn't equal access to voting at the time?"
A Yes.
Q And then you answered, "I knew that Shannon County
residents had to drive to Hot Springs to cast an
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Q But you have never researched the cost of early voting in Shannon County?
A No.
Do you have any idea what it is?
No.
You don't know if it's $\$ 20,000$ ?
I know that their past reimbursement requests forms, one of them was 20,000 . I think one was 28,000 or something. But that doesn't just include absentee voting.
Q Even since the commencement of this litigation, you have never said how much does early voting cost in Shannon County?
A No, because I was going to find out as soon as they submitted their paperwork.
Q And it's your testimony here today that the county hasn't submitted paperwork informing you of how much early voting costs at a physical location in Shannon County?
A As of yesterday, Shannon County has not submitted a reimbursement request.
Q Has Shannon County submitted anything to you regarding the costs of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County?
A Yes; the March letter.
Q Do you recall in the March letter if that told how much early voting cost?

A Yes.
Q All right. Thank you. So today on the different
categories of HAVA funds, you don't know the difference
between the restrictions on Section 101 and Section 251?
A To go into detail, no.
Q Generally.
A No.
Q Do you know of any difference between the restrictions on
Section 101 funds from 251 funds?
A Yes. I know there are differences because --
Q Can you name a single difference here today?
A No.
Q Do you have Exhibit 130 in front of you, sir?
A Yep.
Q Secretary of State Gant, why didn't you ever find out
what the costs of early voting were for in Shannon
County?
A Right now we are just waiting for the county to submit
their expenses.
Q Has the county ever told you this is how much early
voting costs at a physical location in Shannon County for
an election cycle?
A I'd have to look at the March letter, if that is detailed
in there.
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of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County in 2008 before the primary election?
A I don't remember.
Q Ever research it?
A No.
Q Why not?
A I didn't research any counties regarding their 2008.
Q Did you know that Shannon County residents only had two days of early voting before the primary election in Shannon County before -- during the 2008 election cycle?
A I don't remember what the exact number of days were.
Q Do you remember generally how many days there were?
A No.
Q Did you know that there were less days for Shannon County
residents to vote at a location in Shannon County than
other counties -- than other citizens at their county
seat?
A In 2008?
Q Yes, sir.
A When -- at that time, I wasn't -- I wouldn't have been interested in that.
Q Right. But wouldn't you get interested in it when you became Secretary of State and learned in 2010 that the folks down there didn't get the same number of days of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County?

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Again, I don't remember.
You don't know?
No.
All right. So looking at Exhibit 130, on that $\$ 4,714,346$ that was left over in 2008, do you know if that was Section 101 funds or 251 funds?
A At the top of the page it says "HAVA Title I, Section 101 Funds as of December 31, 2008."
Q Thank you. So any of that money could go for early voting costs at a county?
A All HAVA funds have to either follow the HAVA -- have to do both; have to follow the state plan and follow the HAVA Act.
Q My question for you, though, is the money that is described on Page 8 of Exhibit 130 under "HAVA Title I, Section 101 Funds as of December 31st, 2008," can Section 101 funds be spent on early voting locations in a county? And if you don't know, you don't know.
A Well, it's based off the HAVA state plan and the HAVA Act.
Q Right. These Section 101 funds, can they be spent on early voting at a physical location in a county?
A They have to be spent based off the plan. The 2000 -this would have been the 2008. If this was a 2008 state plan, it would have been based off that. So if that was

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Q Who does he report to?
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A My director of elections.
Q Who is your director of elections?
Aaron Lorenzen.
How do you spell Mr. Lorenzen's name?
$L-o-r-e-n-z-e-n$. Lorenzen.
How long has he been in that position?
January of 2011.
What are his duties?
A He oversees the elections department. So everything from
state elections to school elections to city elections,
federal elections, campaign finance, election night
reporting, candidates, petitions, the whole gamut of
elections.
Q All right. What is his role with early voting, if any,
absentee balloting?
A I guess nothing different than what my role would be.
Q All right. So the director of elections reports to you
then?
Yes.
You are his direct supervisor?
Yes.
Do you know where his job duties are listed?
No.
Q Do you know, in the job duties, if there is anything
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general election.
Q All right. Who helped you in your office research?
A It would have been my HAVA coordinator I guess.
Q All right. Let's go through your office staff. Who is
your HAVA coordinator?
A His name is Brandon Johnson.
Q How long has he been your HAVA coordinator?
A I don't remember exactly, but it was probably March of
2011. Somewhere in that spring.
Q What is his job description?
A HAVA coordinator.
Q Right. What are his duties?
A A number of duties. One is the agreed reimbursement
management when all 66 counties submit their information,
making sure that that is all paid out, making sure we are
complying with any new Election Assistance Commission
guidelines. He is also -- other election duties. He
assists with a number of election areas.
Q What does he do specific to HAVA?
A Like I said, the reimbursement, making sure the monies
are correct, making sure that we are running everything
based off what the federal government and state plan
says.
Q Where are his job duties listed?
A I don't know where they are listed.
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specific to HAVA funds?
A That would be a portion because HAVA is -- the HAVA
coordinator reports to him.
Q Okay. What kinds of things does the HAVA coordinator,
Mr. Brandon Johnson, need permission from the director of
elections to do regarding HAVA?
A He's allowed to follow the reimbursement schedule, and
then if there would be anything odd, he would bring that
to Aaron's and I's attention.
Q All right. So the reimbursement schedule, where is that
listed?
A That's the form that all the counties complete after each
election.
Q All right. So the reimbursement schedule is a simple
form?
A Yes.
Q All right. So for Shannon County to go ahead -- and
let's say that this next election costs $\$ 25,000$ for early
voting, all right -- what do they need to do to get that
\$25,000?
A They would need to submit a reimbursement form to the
state.
Q First of all they would have to make all the
expenditures, correct? They would have to go ahead and
spend the money?
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A Absolutely. Yes.
Q All right. And then they would list those expenditures
and show receipts for those expenditures and do what?
A Yes. And submit them to my office.
Q Right. And this reimbursement schedule is a form that
goes ahead and just itemizes the receipts?
A That's correct.
Q And then they have to attach the receipts behind there?
A Yes.
Q All right. And those receipts go to Mr. Brandon Johnson,
your HAVA coordinator?
A The receipts, remember, it's a random sampling to have
the receipts.
Q Explain.
A In the past, the -- how would the random work. We
haven't gone through it, so I don't know exactly how they did it in the past.
Q Generally.
A I would assume they picked ten counties or something and
said you have to submit all your receipts.
Q So not all the counties had to submit receipts to get HAVA money?
A I don't believe so. I believe it's just a random --
Q You just make Shannon County submit receipts and not other counties?

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A This March letter was something different that was not in the norm of what we do.
Q What do you mean, it wasn't in the norm?
A It was additional money that they were asking for.
Q All right. I need to -- tell me everything you know about the random sampling. When did it begin as far as you know?
A I don't know.
Q When you took office, when did you first learn about it?
A I suppose it was a few months into office when we were reviewing the HAVA responsibilities.
Q All right. Who was at the meeting reviewing HAVA responsibilities where you first learned of random sampling?
A I don't remember who was present.
Q Is the term "random sampling" written anywhere in any of the HAVA policies?
A I would have to look at them.
Q Are you aware of the term "random sampling" being described or written anywhere in any HAVA policy?
A No.
Q Are you aware of "random sampling" being mentioned or described or defined or referred to in any Secretary of State policy?
A I would have to look at the 2010 plan again.
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A I'm sure we wondered how they determined it because we knew we were going to have to figure out what we were going to do in the future.
Q Have you ever provided any instruction to any personnel in your office regarding the administration of a random sampling policy for receipts under HAVA?
No, we haven't.
Q Do you know if the director of elections has ever provided any guidance to anybody regarding the
administration of random sampling in your office? Not that I am aware of.
Q Do you know if Brandon Johnson has ever provided any guidance to anyone regarding the application of random sampling in your office?
A No.
Q Who determines if a receipt is necessary or not to get reimbursed?
A I don't know what the policy was in the past. That's what we were trying to figure out.
Q All right. So you didn't -- you knew that there was a random sampling policy in place beginning when?
A I suppose the first six months of being in office.
All right. What did you do about it?
We talked to the county auditors.
Q Which county auditors?
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Q Did you provide any instructions at the training regarding how random sampling would work?

A No. I don't remember speaking specifically about that.
Q Generally?
A I remember speaking about equipment. That was a big concern; having a label on each piece of equipment purchased with HAVA money. I remember talking about the possibility of putting together some sort of web-based system that would make it easy for all the auditors to submit their receipts.
Q Did you ever do that?
A No. We haven't been able to yet.
Q Why not?
A It's on the list, but it just doesn't get done.
Q All right. Have you ever provided any written instructions to any county auditor in the state of South Dakota on when you would need receipts submitted before HAVA reimbursement would occur?
A I don't believe so.
Q Why not?
A Because we had a discussion about it, and we never had a conclusion.
Q All right. So I'm getting this straight, shortly after you took office, you learned that there was random

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sampling. Some counties went ahead and had to submit receipts to get HAVA reimbursement, others did not.

## Correct?

A Correct.
Q Then you had a training with some of the county auditors who attended, correct?
A Some would be -- I would say greater than that.
Q And you did not define the random sampling requirements at that training?
A I think our discussion at that training led more towards we should have everyone submit all receipts so that we don't have to worry about an audit from the Election Assistance Commission.
Q Since you have been Secretary of State, have you required submission of receipts before HAVA reimbursement for every transaction?
A I would have to double-check on what the policy has been. I don't even know if we have received many requests since the June election.
Q All right. You don't have a policy regarding submission of receipts, correct?
A I don't know what we -- what has been decided. They may have, but I don't remember what. I -- if I would have known this question, I would have asked.
Q I don't understand what you just said.

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A If we have received anything from the county auditor since the June election.
Q Do you know if this process of random sampling has been terminated since you became Secretary of State?
I don't, but $I$ know $I$ don't like it.
You don't like it?
No, because I don't want an EAC audit. I would rather have all the receipts so we can just give it to the auditor when they come, if they come, and then it's easier that way.
Q Right. You have -- you have been the boss over there for about a year and a half, correct?
Yes.
Q All right. And you haven't done anything to terminate that random sampling process in the year and a half that you have been the boss?
A There are 66 county auditors, and I try to work with them as much as possible. When I force them or attempt to force them to do something, that doesn't work well. So we have to work together on figuring out how we can do things.

Q All right. Do you recognize this document marked Exhibit 143?
a yes.
Q How are you familiar with this document?
A I thought it was a letter from Shannon county.
Q But this is a letter from --
A Oh, I see.
Q -- from Shannon County's attorney to your attorney?
A Yes.
Q All right. This is the only communication that you are
aware of regarding requests for assistance with early
voting?
A From Shannon County?
Q Yes, sir.
A Yes.
Q No one has ever talked to you about it?
A You sent a number of letters in the fall of 2011.
Q Besides me.
A Yes. I think this was the only letter from Shannon
County Commission.
Q All right. So this was a request for $\$ 12,000$ ?
A An additional allowable reimbursement.
Q Do you know how much total that the South Dakota
Secretary of State is administering to Shannon County
through HAVA funds for early voting for the 2012 election cycle?
A No. I have not received their reimbursement request for
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point because if Sara was at a meeting, she would have been there with me. We would have been discussing a joint defense. And anything said during that meeting would have been subject to attorney/client privilege.

MR. SANDVEN: You're doing joint defense with Sara Frankenstein?

MR. WILLIAMS: If we're talking -- if you're getting at what I'm thinking about, yes, it was a joint defense meeting.
Q Okay. Have you ever had any communication with any
Shannon County official regarding the costs of early
voting in Shannon County?
I don't think so.
Same question; Fall River official.
I have spoken to Sue Ganje numerous times.
About the costs of early voting?
Just spoken with her. Nothing specific like this letter.
Have you ever had any conversation with Sue Ganje
regarding the costs of early voting in Shannon County?
A I'm trying to remember if after the court hearing we had -- I think that was just about the location and how much that -- well, I don't remember if we talked about the cost of renting a location, but -- no, nothing specific like conducting research on --
Q Generally?

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Q Just so I understand your testimony, this is the only communication that you have received regarding the costs of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County? This is it?
A Aside from your letter, yes.
Q Okay. And when you got this letter about the costs, some
of these costs of early voting in Shannon County, you
didn't research what the total cost of early voting in
Shannon County was, correct?
A No, because I didn't -- no.
Q You have never talked with anybody regarding the costs of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County?

MS. FRANKENSTEIN: I'm just going to object here just to remind everyone that at the beginning you asked him not to discuss or give answers regarding his discussions with his attorney. And I just want to make sure your questions are still with that understanding.

MR. SANDVEN: Yes.
A I don't think so.
Q You have never talked with Sara Frankenstein regarding
the costs of early voting in Shannon County?
MR. WILLIAMS: I'm going to object at that point.
Q It's not his attorney, but go ahead and answer.
MR. WILLIAMS: Hold on. I'm going to object at this
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A -- specific -- for some reason I remember something about the location. And I don't remember if she told me how much or if it was expensive or cheap. I don't remember.
Q Do you know if any employee from your office, anyone that works for you, has ever had a conversation with anyone at Fall River or Shannon County regarding the cost of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County?
A I know Fall River has called regarding submitting their form, but they haven't submitted it yet.
Q Do you know if anyone from Fall River or Shannon County has ever went ahead and informed anybody in your office how much an early voting location in Shannon County costs?
A We will know very shortly as soon as they --
Q That's not my question. Do you know if anyone has ever done that?
A I don't know.
Q So as far as you know, no one from your office has ever had any communication with a Shannon County official or Fall River official regarding the cost of early voting at a physical location in Shannon County?
A I don't know.
Q Can you think of a single expenditure from HAVA funds administered by the Secretary of State's office that hasn't required a receipt?

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transactions required receipts and which ones didn't?
A I believe for that form -- I wish I could remember the
name of the form -- that it was everything. I think it
was the whole list.
Q What do you mean?
A Everything on the list. Like if they requested money for
Items 1, 5 and 10, they had to list a receipt for 1, 5
and 10 . So if they were asking for a hundred bucks, they
had to show a receipt for a hundred bucks.
Q Do you remember what kind of things didn't require a
receipt?
A I think everything that they requested money for required
a receipt. I remember seeing like pay stubs for the
AutomARK workers, I remember the Lakota translator. Back
in 2010, I think seven counties were requiring a Lakota
translator. So I remember seeing those receipts. Those
were just some that stuck in my head.
Q Did you ever research what kind of things didn't require
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A I do not remember.
Q Do you remember any county that did not have to submit all their receipts?

A I don't remember either way.
You don't remember any county --
I don't remember counties that submitted receipts, I don't remember counties that did not submit receipts.

Q You just remember that there were some counties that weren't required to submit receipts, but yet they received HAVA funds?

A I'm sorry, one more time.
MR. SANDVEN: Can you read the question back. (Last question read back by the reporter.) Yes.

But you can't remember a single example of that here today? Specific example.

A No. No. The only thing I remember were those few examples of -- well, it had to have been one of those seven Lakota counties that required the Lakota language because I remember seeing a Lakota translator receipt. That didn't have a receipt?

No, that had a receipt. I remember seeing the receipt. Right. My question is, do you remember a single example, specific example, of a county getting HAVA funding without a receipt?

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    I believe everything that was on that sheet that
    requested reimbursement required a receipt.
    Q And everything other than that did not?
    A They didn't request reimbursement for the other things.
    Q So my question is, what things didn't require a receipt
    under the random sampling process that you learned?
    A Things that they didn't spend money on.
    Q For example?
    A Well, if they didn't spend money on Line 12 , they
obviously didn't submit a receipt for Line 12 because
there was no expense for Line 12 .
Q All right. I thought I heard you talk earlier about a
random sampling where some expenditures, HAVA
expenditures, did not require a receipt.
A No. Some counties. The counties -- if you were one of
the counties selected in the sample, you had to submit
all your receipts.
Q All right. So some counties had to submit all the
receipts, other counties did not have to submit all their

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Oh, no. I don't remember a specific example. I just -in the files there is not receipts for every single county, so obviously those counties who did not submit a receipt received money.
Say that again.
There are counties that submitted receipts, received
money, and there are counties that didn't submit receipts
and received money.
And received money?
Uh-huh.
From HAVA?
Yes.
And you saw there was no record or any proof of what
those expenditures were?
Correct.
And you don't remember what counties those were?
I don't.
And you don't remember a single expenditure from those counties without a receipt?
A Everything they put on that form would have been paid unless it was something that was --
Q They just submitted the form without the receipts?
Correct.

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Q Okay. And your -- and so going back, when you learned of that problem, you went to the convention and said we need to work on this?
A Correct.
Q Was there any action taken after the convention with all
the county auditors?
A We probably talked about it that fall again.
Q Do you remember when?
A It would have been whenever the county auditors had their
fall convention.
Q Where was that at?
A Would have been in -- I don't remember the location.
Q Do you remember what you said regarding how you were
going to deal with this random sampling at the second
convention?
A I think it was just recapping what we had spoken about at the first one, and if anyone had any new ideas on how to resolve this problem to avoid a HAVA audit, or if we did have an audit, to make sure that we had everything.
Q So approximately six months elapsed between the two conventions?
A I don't remember, but possibly.
Q And there was no action taken at the second convention?
No.
Q Was there any action taken regarding the random sampling

Did you ever tell Brandon Johnson you need to come up with a solution and stop this random sampling process?
A I don't remember. I just know I don't like it because it's not needed. We should have all the receipts so there is no question.
Q If you didn't like it, why didn't you put out a directive to say everything gets a receipt from this point forward? I don't know.
Q You want to take a little break, sir?
MR. WILLIAMS: If you would like to.
Q Do you want to stop? You have been going an hour. Yes or no, sir?
Oh, I'm fine.
Whatever you want. Do you have Exhibit 131 in front of you?
Yes.
All right. If you go to Page 7, how much did South Dakota get in 2010?
A No. You're not reading that correctly. This is total Section 101, 102, 251 funds received. That means since HAVA was started.
Q So this graph you are saying isn't specific to the December, 2010 fiscal year?
A As of September 30, 2010. There is no way South Dakota received $\$ 18$ million on September 30 th of 2010 . Well, I

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shouldn't say no way, but I don't think that is right at all.
Do you know how much money that South Dakota did receive in 2010?
I don't.
No idea?
I don't.
Do you know how much money South Dakota spent in 2010?
I don't, but $I$ don't believe it was the $\$ 8$ million number
there.
What do you believe it was, approximately?
Much, much less than that.
Less than a million?
To know the exact number, I would have to look at the total -- do we have that spreadsheet as a -- the only thing I remember about 2010 money that was spent for sure was the 660,000 that was spent on January 1 of 2011.
And what was that spent on?
Previous Secretary gave 10,000 to each county.
Have you had any -- have you had any discussions with Fall River or Shannon County regarding future elections after 2012?
A With who?
Q Either Fall -- Fall River or Shannon County Commissions regarding early voting in Shannon County after 2012.

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Q What had you given them pre-approval for for the primary? They can spend the 72,000 as they deem appropriate?
A I haven't given them pre-approval. I said I will allow an additional \(\$ 12,000\) in reimbursement.
Q Beyond --
A They may only spend \(\$ 10,000\). As soon as we get the receipts, we will know, or the forms.
Q All right. You have no idea how much early voting is going to cost in Shannon County for the 2012 primary election, correct?
A They have not submitted their forms.
Q You have no idea?
A I do not know. I will know, but I don't today.
Q As of today, you don't know how much it will cost? You have no idea how much --
A How much it cost. It happened already.
Q You still don't know how much it cost?
A They haven't submitted their reimbursement forms yet.
Q You don't have any idea how much the primary election, the early voting, cost in Shannon County?
A I know they had rent and staff.
Q Do you know how much rent was?
A No.
Q Do you know how much staff was?
A Nope.
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Q Do you know how much travel was?
A I would assume they are using state rates.
Do you know how much per diem was?
No.
Do you know how much overtime was?
No.
Do you know how much miscellaneous was?
No.
Do you know how much the notices, the publications, were?
No.
So the only cost that you know associated with early
voting is the miles -- the mileage cost that uses the state rate?

A The state rate is 37 and a half cents. I assumed Shannon County uses that -- or Fall River uses that. I think it's 37 and a half.
Q But it's your testimony today that Shannon County has $\$ 72,000$ for early voting from HAVA funds for the entire 2012 election cycle?
No.
Correct me.
It's not just for absentee voting. It's for all of their HAVA-related, HAVA state plan, HAVA Act, activities. And the 60,000 is what I remember as their account balance.

I assume I'm close to right, but --
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Q And the early voting costs for a location in Shannon County, those costs are only incurred once every two years, correct, every election cycle?

Correct.
No -- no costs for early voting in off-election years?
Unless there would be a special election.
Unless there would be a special.
Yeah.
Would it surprise you that the cost of doing six full weeks of early voting for both the primary and the general was less than $\$ 50,000$ every two years?
A I do not know. I don't know. I don't know what the high and low is for Pine Ridge and Fall River and --
And as far as you know, no one in your office has ever taken the time to find out how much early voting costs No.
-- in Shannon County?
A No, because we are going to find out hopefully within days.
Q Why did you tell Shannon County that they needed to submit receipts initially before you would reimburse when other counties didn't have to?
A This was a special situation. This $\$ 12,000$ was not offered to other counties. It was only offered to Shannon.
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- Go ahead

A There aren't any budgeted amounts.
Q So how do you determine how much each county gets?
MS. FRANKENSTEIN: Objection. This has been asked and answered.
Q Go ahead and answer.
A In previous years, when they received money, it was disbursed.
Q As far as you know here today -- you are the secretary of State, chief election officer. Tell me everything you know about the criteria for determining how much HAVA money each county is allocated. Tell me everything you know.
A The criteria --
Q Shannon County gets this much, Todd gets this much, Pennington gets this much. How is that determined by the Secretary of State's office?
A It was done by the previous Secretary and the previous --
I suppose it was in the state -- state HAVA plans.
Q Do you have any idea how the previous Secretary of State did it?

A Like I mentioned before, the one I remember was right
2012 were determined by who?
MS. FRANKENSTEIN: He already testified there is no budgeted amounts.
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before I took office where each county received $\$ 10,000$.
Q It was just a flat rate regardless of need to each county?
A Yes, sir.
And who came up with that criteria?
That was the previous Secretary.
Did you ever do anything to address that criteria where each county gets the same amount?
A I haven't received any new federal money to distribute to counties. At I mentioned before, there is only that roughly $\$ 6,000$.
Q Since you have been Secretary of State, have you done anything to go ahead and identify any criteria for
determining how much money each county gets?
MS. FRANKENSTEIN: For new HAVA funding?
MR. SANDVEN: For any HAVA funding.
A No. We haven't set a plan. Right now there is only $\$ 6,000$, so it's not a huge chunk of money for the whole state.
You have a lot of money sitting there right now, right?
Yes, sir.
How much money do you have sitting in an account right now?
There is roughly 9 million.
Who administers that account?
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Spends the money, you mean or -What -- who authorizes approval of that? It would be the state auditor. All right. And the approval process requires that you submit -- you authorize the expenditure and he pays it, correct?
Yes. We have to fill out forms that the auditor's office requires.
All right. So there is $\$ 9$ million plus sitting there. Give or take. I don't remember the exact number right now.
Since you have been South Dakota Secretary of State, what has been the minimum amount in that account?
has been the minimum amount in that account?

I don't know.
Q No idea?
A I would assume it's around the 9 million. It receives interest just like any other state trust fund.
Q So as far as you know, since you have been Secretary of State, there has been approximately $\$ 9$ million in the HAVA account?
Yes, sir.
And that account is maintained in what bank?
I don't know. State treasurer or state auditor, Bureau of Finance Management. Whatever bank the state funds are held in I assume. DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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Q You don't know what Public Law 9473 is?
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Q All right. Have you ever went ahead -- do you have anything to do with the agenda?
A Yes. I set the agenda.
Q When and how do you set the agenda?
A We don't have scheduled meetings like on a quarterly basis or anything. When there is items that come up or that there has been a request to change administrative rules, then $I$ would call a meeting and -- call the meeting and develop the agenda.
Q Have you ever -- have you ever put early voting issues on the agenda for the election commission down at -- you know, for the early voting issues down in Shannon County?
A I don't remember if it was on the agenda, but I remember we talked about this lawsuit at one of our meetings. All right. Was your lawyer present?
No.
You just -- what did you talk about?
Just that there was a lawsuit concerning early voting in Shannon County.
What was the discussion? Any thoughts on fixing it? None that I remember.
Was there any conversation on the folks down in Shannon County should get the same number of days that other residents do?
A I think it was a pretty brief summary. There was this

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A Is that the federal -- no.
Q That is the Voting Rights Act.
A Oh .
Q You didn't know that you're supposed to provide notice to
the affected counties that are covered by the Voting
Rights Act?
A I said I didn't know what 94 whatever is.
Q Okay. Have you done anything to -- with your
notification requirements with respective counties
regarding the Voting Rights Act?
A Could I look at the statute?
Q Do you have 12-3-6? Then while they are searching for
that, you are the chairman of the election board?
A Yes.
Q All right. The election board goes ahead and promulgates
rules for elections?
A Yes.
Q What is your role with -- with -- as chairman of the election board? What do you do?
A I have a vote on the board. I am responsible for not just chairing the meeting, but also the secretary, so meeting minutes and filing all the necessary paperwork with the Legislative Research Council regarding the administrative rules, publishing the notices in the newspaper, that whole process.

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lawsuit and there was a pistol permit lawsuit.
Who gave the report?
Me.
Did you provide any remedies on how it could be fixed? The lawsuit?
Yeah. You were talking with the Election Commission, correct?
Yes. I don't think so. I think we just talked about how it's out there, and we have to go to court and figure out -- do what the Court says.
Q This was before the preliminary injunction hearing or after?
I don't remember.
Q Did you let them know if we gave -- give the Shannon County folks the same number of days of early voting that everyone else gets, this would just go away?
I don't remember.
What do you remember saying to the election commission?
I remember talking about there being a lawsuit regarding
Shannon County.

- And --

A That's it.
Q Was the meeting recorded?
A No.
Q Was that part of the meeting in executive session?
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A No. I don't believe we have had any executive sessions since I have been there.

Q How come you have never put on the agenda some proposed rules for early voting in Todd or Shannon County?
A Because there already are administrative rules regarding all counties in the state.
Q Are there -- is Shannon County and Todd County different
to you than the other counties?
A No.
Q Having a county seat or not having a county seat doesn't
change anything?
A As far as the law, no.
Q All right. Do you think it's a hardship on Shannon County residents to have to drive to Hot Springs to cast their vote in person? Do you think that is a hardship?
A I think it's unfortunate.
Q Why do you think it's unfortunate?
A Because they don't have a courthouse in their county.
Q But do you think it's a hardship on the folks that live
over there?
A Yes. It's far to drive.
Q And you knew up in Pennington County you have a
satellite, correct?
A I don't. Pennington County does.
Q You were aware of a satellite location up in Pennington
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that at one of our Board of Election meetings.
Q Right. One of your responsibilities is to provide any absentee uniformed service and overseas voter
information?
Yes. There are administrative rules for that.
How to vote absentee?
Yes.
Right. So you, as chair of the Election Commission, you
promulgate rules and do that?
I didn't do that specific one, but, yes.
Your office did?
Yes.
All right. Is there anything that restricts you from promulgating rules regarding early voting in Shannon County?
A
Those have to be run through the administrative rules process and approved by the Board of Elections.
And you would set the agenda for that?
Yes.
Do you have any intentions of setting the agenda for
promulgating rules for how early voting is done in
Shannon or Todd County?
A It's the same -- it's already in administrative rule for all of South Dakota.
Q Right. But you would agree the circumstances are a

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    little bit different in Shannon County than other counties because you don't have a county seat, correct?
A Even though they don't have a county seat, the 2012 election was, in my mind, the same as every other county.
Q The 2012 election, the primary was the same as every other?
A Because they had absentee voting in their county, just like other counties.
The full six-week period?
Yes. Well, 46 days. It's a little more than six weeks. At the hearing you went ahead and said that some of the counties did weekend voting at the courthouse.
Yes.
Who?
I remember reading on KELO-Land.com that Minnehaha would.
In Sioux Falls?
Yes, sir.
And they did Saturday voting?
Saturday absentee voting.
Do you remember the hours?
I don't think it was all day. Might have been for the morning or something. I didn't print out the KELO article.

A I don't know. I only know they were open on $I$ think it was Monday before the election because I voted that day. Q You don't know which days of early voting your county -the early voting was available?
A I don't go to the Hughes County courthouse every day.
Q Okay. Here is what I'm getting at. At the -- you are disagreeing in Paragraph 2 with the six weeks of early voting?
A Six times seven is 42 days. State law says 46 days.
Q Right. And when you look at the state law, you are referring to 12-16-1? You have got the code book in front of you. And I think it says that absentee ballot voting shall begin no earlier and no later than 46 days prior to the election.
A What was the number?

Q And everyone else can, including up until the 3 -- can go to the early voting location until 3:00 p.m. of election day?
A Shannon County doesn't have a courthouse, so they can't go to their courthouse.
Q That's why the first sentence says "Except for Shannon and Todd Counties...," right?
A Yes.
Q They are the only two counties without a courthouse?

Q All right. And then the Paragraph 4, Pennington County --
A Corson County, their courthouse blew up. I don't remember when that was. But they may not have had a courthouse, and they obviously had a different location after it burned down.

I don't think so.

Q Why didn't you provide that money well before that March 1st request? This letter to you is dated November 14th, 2011.
I wasn't asked by Shannon County until March 1st. So you needed Shannon County to go ahead and ask you for money before you got involved in this situation? I didn't know who you were. Okay. And at the end of the letter where it says that I am the attorney for those Pine Ridge folks --
I still didn't know who you were.
Okay. Did you make any efforts to find out?
No.
All right. So then you knew -- in Paragraph 6, do you agree that "Private parties paid approximately $\$ 15,000$ to

A I don't have either side. I don't know. I don't know if it was four hours, I don't know if it was two hours, I don't know if it was ten hours.

Q Is there any time that you would get involved in a county election except for someone -- someone providing you notice pursuant to $12-18-41$ ?
A Get involved. I don't understand.
Investigate a complaint.
A Would I investigate a complaint. That I received from the county?
Q Would you ever investigate a complaint that was received by a private citizen of a county regarding
electioneering?
A We would -- on election day, any election day, when we receive calls or complaints, we would call the county auditor and let them know what we had heard and ask what's the story.
Q What about before election day with any election procedure, would you ever get involved in handing a complaint at any time?
A If we were to receive a complaint that -- I suppose it's possible.
Q When --
A I'm trying to think of one that we have done, but -- I can't think of one. I can't think of one.

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A State law requires them to be in charge of their election.

Q State law also requires early voting for 46 days ahead of time, right?

A Yes, it does.
Q So why didn't you get involved then?
A Because it wasn't my responsibility. And I wasn't asked until March 1st to offer assistance. And I immediately did.

Q Didn't I ask you on November 14th, 2011?
A Ask me what?
Q That you assist Shannon County.
A Your first sentence says, "...is provided to request whether HAVA funds have been budgeted or made available..."

Q And then if you go down to the third paragraph, "I am requesting clarification of budgeting and distribution of HAVA funds for the upcoming election cycle to avoid the following issues in past elections in Shannon County."

Wasn't I reaching out to you, asking for you to intervene and make sure these problems of old didn't happen again?

A I don't know for sure.
Q When you read -- when you read this third paragraph on Page 1 of Exhibit 93, I'm asking clarification to avoid

A I don't know.
Q You didn't take it as a request for you to go ahead and
intervene, this letter?
A No. Took it as a legal matter.
Q You took it as a legal matter; a legal matter that needed
to go to the attorney but didn't require involvement by
you?
A Yes.
Q Okay. And then in Paragraph 17 of this November 14 th,
2011 letter where I state "Private individuals paid
approximately $\$ 5,000$ for a single alternative voting
location...," did you know that happened?
A I thought I just read it was 15,000 .
Q I think there were two different checks for two different
periods.
A $\quad \mathrm{Oh}$.
Q You don't know?
A I do not.
Q Never found out how much money came from private sources
to pay for early voting?
A No.

Why not?
It's not my responsibility.
Whose responsibility is that?
The budgeting and accounting, would be Shannon county. And if they are not fulfilling their responsibilities, whose job is it to -- whose responsibility is it to check up on them?
I don't know what state agency that is.
So if a county commission isn't conducting proper elections and doesn't ask for your help, you stay out of it?

Yes. I don't run their election.
Q As the chief election officer, you have no oversight over their elections?

I don't. I can't force an auditor to do anything.
Okay. I'm going to hand you what's been marked
Exhibit 95, sir. Do you recognize this document dated
November 26, 2011 from my office?
Yes.
All right. This was the second request?
It says it in the letter.
Did you read this memorandum?
Yes.
All right. So this was a couple of weeks after that first letter?

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Did you take this as a request from your office for intervention?

I took it as a legal matter.
Okay. You didn't -- didn't follow up on any of the allegations in this November 26, 2011 letter?
No.
Why not?
It's not my responsibility.
Okay. So this said the same things as what we are
stating in the November 14 th letter?
I assume so.
So whose responsibility is it to make sure that the
Shannon County residents get the same number of voting
days on-site as everybody else?
Shannon County.
Q All right. And if they are not doing their job, who's supposed to intervene?
I don't know.
All right. The right to vote, is that one of the most fundamental rights to you? I think you talk about that on your website.
A It's a very important right.
Q There's not much more important than conducting fair elections, is there?

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A It's very important.
Q One of the most fundamental rights there are?
A I may think that, but when we only had 20 percent turnout this past June, it makes me think that 80 percent of the public don't consider it a fundamental right.
Q But if you see that fundamental right being violated in a
particular county, you won't get involved?
A It's not my responsibility.
Q If a county isn't doing their job in conducting full and
fair elections, whose job is it to get involved?
A I don't know.
Q All right. So this November 6th, 2000 letter, what is
this marked -- Exhibit Number 95 -- the one you have -- I
just handed to you, sir?
A Yes.
Q So you handed that to your lawyers and didn't do anything
else with it. Correct?
A Correct.
Q I hand you what's been marked Exhibit 94. Do you
remember getting this letter, sir, from my office on December 19th, 2011?
A Yes.
Q Do you remember what you did with it?
A Gave it to my attorney.
Q Did you read it first?
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towards your office until the March 1st, 2012 letter they sent to you regarding early voting?
A The March 1st was the first formal request. I don't know if there was a question or something in all of 2011.
Q Was there an informal request from Shannon County to you for assistance with early voting?
A
I'm just saying I don't know if Shannon County or Fall River County called my office in 2011. There's a lot of phone calls.
Q Do you know if the cost of an early voting location in 2000 -- for the 2012 primary election is less than a hundred thousand dollars?
A I do not.
Have you researched how much it would cost to guarantee early voting in Shannon County for the 2014 election? No.
Q Could your office go ahead and commit HAVA funds to -right now and give a preliminary approval to Shannon County for 2014?
No.
Why not? Where is the restriction?
A The laws could change. State law could change on the number of absentee voting days. The federal law regarding HAVA could change.
Q So because the law could potentially change in the next DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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two or three or four election cycles, you can't go ahead and make any commitment to Shannon County folks or Fall River folks that you will go ahead and commit HAVA funds as long as it's lawful to these upcoming election cycles? If you use the words "as long as it's lawful," we could begin a discussion.
Do you want to do that?
I suppose I would be open to that.
What -- what percent of Shannon County is Indian?
I think one of your letters said 95 percent.
Over 95 percent. Would you agree?
I was just taking what you had told me. I don't have the census statistics.
Q You have never researched how many of the folks are from tribal or federally recognized tribes down there?
No, sir.
How come?
Not my responsibility.
Okay. Under the voting rights laws -- remember, we talked about earlier -- it's kind of your responsibility to go ahead and notify those affected counties that they are covered by provisions of Public Law 9473? That is your job, isn't it, under 12-3-6?
A When you asked this question earlier, this notice requirement in $12-3-6$ is regarding the designation of DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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counties in South Dakota under the Voting Rights Act. So 1 that would have been done each census.

Q Right. But you are supposed to -- you are supposed to under -- if you go -- let's go to 12-3-13.
A Yep.
Q That is the state Board of Elections, correct?
A Correct.
Q That's where you are the chair?
A Yes, sir.
Q That's where you set agendas?
A Yes, sir.
Q You preside over those meetings?
A Yes.
Q You have a vote at those meetings?
A Yes.
Q All right. At those meetings, it's your responsibility
to go ahead and promulgate rules to implement,
administer, and enforce further federal administrative rulings made pursuant to Public Law 9473, correct?

Yes.
Q And it's also your job to implement and administer and enforce 12-3-6 to 12-3-13, correct?

MR. WILLIAMS: Object. When you're talking about "your responsibility," are you talking about the responsibility of the Secretary of State or the Board of

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MR. WILLIAMS: Objection. Probably calls for a legal conclusion. You may answer.
I would have to look at Public Law 9473 again.
I think under 12-3-6, which you read earlier, I thought that the Secretary of State shall notify those affected counties that they are covered by the provisions of Public Law 9473.
Correct.
So you are supposed to know what counties are covered under the Voting Rights Act, aren't you?
If Public Law 9473 talks about the Lakota language and the census changes, then, yes, because after the 2010 census, the census said that no South Dakota counties require Lakota language.
Right. Do you know what 9473 is?
I am assuming it's the Voting Rights Act.
Do you know what the Voting Rights Act is?
Yes.
All right. It's an act to amend the Voting Rights Act -9473 was an act to amend the Voting Rights Act of '65 to extend certain provisions for an additional seven years, and to make permanent the ban against certain
prerequisites to voting. You knew that, right?
Yes.
Do you know what counties in the State of South Dakota
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Elections?
Q The state Board of Elections where you preside.
A The state Board of Elections.
Q Yep. That's the state Board of Elections'
responsibility?
A That's what it says in the first line. I am assuming
those haven't changed.
Q And you haven't -- you think the law might have changed?
A I don't know. I'm just saying I haven't gone through all
the -- whatever those are called in the back.
MS. FRANKENSTEIN: Pocket part.
Q Do you want to check if the law has changed?
A Sure. (Reviewing South Dakota Code.) No, it hasn't been
changed.
Q Okay. And you haven't taken any action to promulgate
rules regarding early voting in Shannon County, have you?
A There is already administrative rules regarding absentee
voting for all of South Dakota in law today.
Q There is only two counties that have to contract out
their auditor services, correct, in the State of South
Dakota?
A Yes.
Q And those two counties are Todd and Shannon, correct?
A Yes.
Q And they are both covered under Public Law 9473, correct?
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are covered by the Voting Rights Act?
I believe it's only Todd and Shannon.
All right. Do you know what provisions in the Voting
Rights Act are applicable to those two counties?
A The biggest area for us is the Lakota language, to make
sure we have someone who speaks Lakota.
Q Secretary of State, have you ever had any training on the
Voting Rights Act?
By "training," what do you mean?
Any kind of training, anywhere, anytime.
No.
Never had any training?
Have I taken a class?
Any kind of training, anytime, anywhere.
No.
Have you ever read the Voting Rights Act?
Yes.
All right. So as far as you know, the notice of the
affected counties under 9473 went out when?
A The law was passed in 1976, so I would guess back then.
Q Can you go to 12-1-9. And it's called Rule Making Power
of the Board.
Y Yep.
Have you read this before, sir?
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Q So this is the authorities of the state Board of
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Elections to promulgate rules, correct?

A Correct.
Q Looking at Subsection 4, the Uniformity of Election Procedures --
A Yes.
Q -- there wasn't uniformity of election procedures in these two counties, was there?
A When?
Q Before the 2012 primary.
MR. WILLIAMS: I'm going to object. Calls for a legal conclusion. You can answer it.
A During the 2012, I believe everything was followed.
Before that there are numerous stories about laws not being followed.
Q Let's hear about "numerous stories about laws not being followed." Numerous stories, number one, from where?
A I don't know. Your three letters.
Q Okay. That is stories about laws not being followed?
A I guess.
Q That is what you consider them to be, stories about laws
not being followed? These are your words, not mine.
A Yeah.
Q Okay. Take me back there. Wasn't I alleging there
wasn't uniformity in the election procedures?
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I am not responsible for the Shannon County election. Shannon County is.
Q So it wasn't even on your priority list to go ahead and intervene and go ahead and deal with early voting in those two counties?
A No.
Q All right. But if you were sitting as the chair of the state Board of Elections, you were supposed to have uniformity in election procedures. You have two counties that have to run to another county for early voting. That is not uniformity, is it?
A The state law is uniform. Everyone has to do the same thing.
Q Everyone has to run to another county to cast their early vote?
A Absentee voting either happens at the courthouse or a satellite location. Like in the June, 2012, they had a satellite location in Pine Ridge.
Q All right. So you are saying that you provided for uniformity in the election procedures after this litigation was commenced, you provided the funding for the 46 -day period?
A I provided the additional funding based off the March 1 request.

MR. SANDVEN: Okay. Want to break for lunch for an
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 courthouse for many, many years. You would have to ask -- I don't know; 1970s, 1960s.
Q Why prior administrations didn't go ahead and deal with this?
A Yeah.
Q So when you came in as the new Secretary of State, you have got a big laundry list of all the things you need to get done?

Q It wasn't a priority for you to go ahead and provide early voting in Shannon and Todd Counties at physical locations there?

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Q For 2008 it's about -- here's a calculator if that will help you.

A $\$ 10,419.52$
Q Okay. What line items are you adding up there, sir?
A The total under Line 17.
MR. WILLIAMS: This is just one reimbursement
request. Would there have been another request also that year?

A I am assuming this is from their general election in November of 2008. So there's possible that there is a reimbursement from the June, 2008 primary.

Q Do you know if there were other reimbursements during this election?

A In 2008?
Q Yeah. For Shannon County.
A I would have to look.
Q All right. Right now you don't know how much money Shannon County received in 2008?

A I don't know how much they requested after the June primary.

Q All right. Earlier you were talking about Line Items 1 through 17.

A Yep.
Q Those were things that required receipts?
No. These were items that were allowable expenses to be

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voting machines?
A It could also be Number 7.
Q Training election workers in the proper operation of maintenance of voting machines and scanners?

A Those are required at absentee voting locations.
Q So early voting funds could come out of Line Item 7, Line Item 14 on your form. Any other line item?

A Really all of them. Supplies -- I mean they had to have supplies, Number 15. Computerized statement. You could also look at 13 because they had -- they had to have two -- they may not have printed out the list. But they had to have a list at the Hot Springs office and then they had to have a list at the Pine Ridge office.

Yeah.
Obviously Number 10 wouldn't because that is not election day, but -- I would assume they posted the sample ballot at the place or they at least had sample ballots available. Vote here signs, mileage, workers hired. What line item are you referencing now, sir? I was referencing the description of how -- of Row 17 project.
Q Might be easier to do it this way. Which line items wouldn't cover early voting expenditures on this form, Line Items 1 through 17?

A Probably not Number 6 because that is on election night.

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Q All right. You said there were some counties who submitted this form without receipts and went ahead and received payment.
A Yes. In the files there were counties that didn't have receipts.
Q For 2010?
A I think we were looking at 2010.
Q Okay. So why did you make it a condition on Shannon County in 2012 that they go ahead and submit receipts? A The $\$ 12,000$ was not normal, so I wanted to have receipts so that should there be an audit, I can justify it.
Q What wasn't normal about it? Didn't it fit into one of these 17 line items?
A It wasn't normal because I didn't give any other counties additional money for 2012.
Q Right. Which one of these line items was it included in?
A They haven't submitted their expense form yet.
Q What is your understanding of what the 12,000 was to be utilized for?
A I think the letter said absentee voting.
Q All right. And what line item would that fit under on this form?

A I suppose it would be Line 14.
Q Hiring extra poll workers to help implement accessible
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Anything else?
I suppose 17-2. I don't know how that could relate to absentee voting. Cost of ballot -- 17-3, cost of ballot printer training to improve your ballot printing. We don't print the ballots of absentee voting.
So no on 17-2, no on 17-3 for early voting? Correct?
17-4, they don't have an ERM in Shannon or Fall River.
So 17-2, 17-3, 17-4 does not apply to early voting,
Mr. Gant?
Yes. I'm still reading.
Correct? Those areas don't apply?
Correct.
Okay.
Okay. Yes, those would be it.
So on this -- on this chart, the only lines that don't apply are $6,10,17-2$ through 17-4?
Yes.
Q And you don't have any idea how much money went to
Shannon County from HAVA funds in 2008?
A Not without the reports in front of me. I mean obviously they received the 10,400 something.

Q Approximately what percent of 2008 HAVA funds were not used by anybody?
I do not know.
Can you look at Exhibit 130, Pages 8 and 12.
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4.7 million.

Q $4,714,346$ ?
Yes.
And that was Section 101 funds, correct?
Yes.
All right. Then if you go to Page 12, that is
Section 251 funds that were remaining?
7,007,824.
Q All right. So what percent of the funds weren't utilized
in 2008, of HAVA funds?
A What percent?
Q There is a calculator. It's the money coming in and
that's -- you just described the money that was left
over, right?
A The balance as of -- on the HAVA Title II, Section 251,
I'm not seeing what the date was, but on the first one it
said -- the 101 -- 101 funds, it was as of December 31 of

Q Right. Do you have any idea what percent of Section 101

A $\quad$ No.
Q Do you have any idea what percent of Section 251 funds

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A Yes. Total expenditures.

A That was the balance of the funds and interest as of
December 31, 2008.

I don't know.
Q Okay. Assuming that the same end date is used throughout this report, how much money rolled over in 2009?
It would be 7 million plus the 4.7 million.

Q $\quad 11.7$ million, money in South Dakota's HAVA account rolled over into 2009?
A I can't say that.
What can you say?
A That as of December 31, 2008, 4.7 million rolled over from 101, and on 251 funds, 7,007,000 rolled over as of whatever that date is.
Q Whatever the reporting period is for this report?
A For the second -- for Table 4.1, HAVA Title II Section 251 funds.
Q Right. So that is $\$ 11.7$ million plus that rolled over DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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Assuming it's the same date range of December 31, 2008.
Q If you look at the cover of the report, what is this report?
A Annual Report on Grant Programs, U.S. Election Assistance Commission, fiscal year 2008.

Q So do you have any reason to refute the findings in this report?

A These two tables are different. One lists a date, and I don't find the other date on the 251 funds.

Q So you don't know if that $\$ 7$ million in 251 funds was for 2008, even though it came from the 2008 report?
A Well, if my memory is right, the federal fiscal year ends, I believe, in October. But this report, the 101 funds, says as of December 31, 2008.
Q So you're -- you don't know if this is going off a
calendar or fiscal year?
A At the bottom here it says fiscal year 2008.
Then it references --
December 31 .
December 31 .
But the second report on Page 12 doesn't list a date.
So when you read this report, you can't tell how much money rolled over in HAVA funds in 2008?
A Whatever date range this report is based off of, yes, you can.

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during the reporting period here. How much did the state start with in 2008?

A I don't see that number in the report.
Q Okay. When you look at Exhibit 129, and go to Page 4, sir, it looks like South Dakota started -- or ended 2007 and started 2008 with $\$ 11,550,925$ in their account. Is that correct?
A I believe these are total funds since inception of HAVA that have been distributed to the states.
Q In Exhibit 129, Page 4?
A Well, at the top of the report on Page 3, it says in total 1.2 billion has been expended. And that's the remaining balance. But that says expended. Oh, has not been expended. Balance 1.2. Okay. I was right. What was the question again?
Q All right. Do you know how much money was left in the HAVA account at the end of 2007 going into 2008?
A If this is based off a calender year, and this report is through December 31 of 2007, then the South Dakota balance was 11.5 million. But I haven't found where it says the date range.
Q All right. And then the balance at the end of 2008 was what, looking at Exhibit 130 and adding those two numbers?
A The 11.7 million.

Since then we have applied for a grant from Harvard University. We made the second round there.
Cooperatively with Oglala Sioux Tribe?
On this one, no. The other grant that we worked on with -- what was the gentleman's name? David something. And we had meetings with -- what is the name of the place here in Ft. Pierre?
Q Can't help you. This is your town, not mine, sir.
A Wacipi. The building right across in Ft. Pierre. I
can't remember the -- what is her name, Stacy something,
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county officials and the Shannon County folks? Have you ever heard anything about that?
A I think that was talked about at the court hearing.

from --
A I'm saying that people that don't live in the county seat
are going to have to do what you are explaining, about
taking off work or doing whatever arrangements they have
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the folks in Pine Ridge to cast their early vote?
They didn't in 2012.
In 2010?
The arrangements then were then. But this is not what is
taking place today. So I don't believe that that 63 is
correct. It should be zero because the largest city in
Shannon County is Pine Ridge, and they had -- they had
absentee voting.
Q Can you do anything to make sure that the folks at Pine
Ridge don't have to drive to Hot Springs and go through
this mess again in future elections?
A We just did on March 2nd.
Q Right. That is for the past elections.
A No, it's not.
Q And that covers the general -- that covers one election
cycle, doesn't it, the 2012?
A All of 2012. The general election's whatever, three
months away, four months away.
Q Anything you can do to make sure these folks don't have
to go through this again in future elections?
In 2014?
Yeah.
Yeah. We discussed that.
will you do it?
Yeah. I'm open to it.
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Q What will you do to make sure this doesn't happen again?
A Figure out what we can do to offer more assistance.
Q I think Box Elder is the biggest town in Meade.
A Is it really?
Q I'm going to hand you what's been marked Exhibit 57.
Remember writing this letter to me?
Yeah.
Q And this is your letter, December 30th, 2011?
Yes.
Q Did you write this or just sign it?
A Signed it.
Q Who wrote it for you?
A Staff member.
Q Which staff member?
A Andrew Pietrus.
Q Did you review it before you sent it to me?
A Yes.
Q All right. So as of December 30th, 2011, you said that Shannon County had $\$ 68,910.78$ remaining in their HAVA state account.

A Correct.
Q And it could be used in conjunction with expenses based off the attached form.
A And that attached form would have been that reimbursement form similar to Exhibit 133.

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Yes.
Q Is there a relationship in your opinion between early voting or absentee voting at a location in Shannon County and voter turnout?
A I think there is a bigger factor in the political parties' and the political candidates' involvement in the election.

Q So that is a larger factor, but do you think having absentee voting at a location in Shannon County encourages voter turnout?
A Based off the numbers of the June 2012 primary, the answer would be no.
Q Okay. We'll start looking at other voter turnout records, too. This morning you talked about -- you don't have any authority unless -- you know, to deal with election problems unless a county commission goes ahead and brings you a complaint. If an individual in Shannon County has a concern regarding an election procedure and their county commission or their county auditor isn't responsive to them, what are they supposed to do?
A Oh, they could call our office.
Q But I thought you said you didn't get involved in those things unless the county went ahead --
A No. Your letter was a legal matter. We get calls from citizens all the time with questions about elections and

Q In Shannon County?
A 1,673 . And I don't see on this report whether it's general election or primary election. Maybe it's under the sticker, but -- what's the total? It's probably the general. But if this was Janklow, that big primary -was that in '04? Q I'm going to hand you what's been marked Exhibits 47 and 48. Do you recognize these documents, sir?

A Yes. I don't know if there is a difference.
MR. CWACH: 48 was a copy for him.
Q What are those two documents, sir, from your website?
A Yes.
Q What are they?
A They are -- Exhibit 47 is number of absentee ballots returned and percentage voting absentee. And then 48 would be actual turnout and actual turnout percentage. Q Right. So what was the -- how many of the folks voted early voting during the 2006 election cycle?
A There were 93,285 --
Q In Shannon County?
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Q Okay. So did you know that private sources paid for 15 days of early voting at a location in Pine Ridge?
A I know that based off of previous conversation we had today.
Q Nothing -- you don't have anything that will refute that?
A I don't have anything that proves it either.
Q All right. There were no days of early voting before the
primary and special election to replace Janklow?
A I do not know.
Q Did you know that private sources met with Shannon County in early September to go ahead and figure out how to pay
for early voting at the general in 2004?
A No idea.
Q All right. From those exhibits in front of you, can you
tell what percent of folks participated in early voting?
A The percent voting by absentee was 36.78 percent.
Q Was it -- it was 37.8 percent?
A Percent voting absentee, 36.78 percent.
Q All right. Out of the 1673 voters, is that how many voted early?
A Number of absentee ballots, yes.
Q And the overall turnout in Shannon County doubled from
the turnout in 2000?
A I do not know.
Q But over one-third of the folks in Shannon County that
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A -- who absentee voted. In Shannon County there were 69.
Q All right. So it dropped the number from the previous election in 2004. Shannon County dropped from 1673 to 69?
A Yes.
Sixteen hundred four votes less?
Yes.
They went from 36 percent to 2.8 percent?
Yes.
Q Did you know that there was no early voting during the
2006 election cycle at a location in Shannon County?
I do not.
No one ever told you that?
I don't -- I don't remember.
Never read it in the lawsuit?
I don't remember.
First time you have heard it is here today?
I don't know.
Do you know why the vote collapsed from -- early voting from 37.8 percent to 2.8 percent --
No.
-- in one election cycle?
No.
Do you have any idea how that happened?
I don't have an idea on 2004 or 2006, but I believe 2012
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had a similar election as 2006 because there was -- it was just under five percent.
Q Right. So you don't know how there could have been a drop in the number of absent -- people participating in the absentee balloting process from the 2004 to 2006 election cycle?
A Each election is different with the political parties and political candidates.
Q And that's what it's due to in your opinion, not access to early voting location?
A I would assume that is one factor, the differences in the laws or what took place in Shannon County.
Q What changes in the law happened in Shannon County between 2004 and 2006?
A Whatever you had just mentioned.
Q I didn't mention any laws changing during 2004 and 2006. I stated that prior to the 2004 election cycle, the law changed where you didn't need a reason to request an absentee ballot. Were there laws that changed between '04 and '06 regarding -- that affected absentee balloting?
A I don't remember.
Q All right. So what role do you think that the lack of absentee balloting or absentee voting in Shannon County affected the 2004 to 2006 cycle?

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Q Can you speculate?
A I just did with the different types of political campaign
that could have been taking place in that year.
And that's what affects voter turnout?
I think that is a factor.
How big a factor is it that there wasn't access to early
voting in Shannon County --
I don't know.
Q -- for the 2006 cycle?
A I don't know.
Q It went from 36 percent and change to two percent and
change. It went from 1673 voters to 69 voters. What
percent of that do you think was due to no early voting
locations?
A I don't know.
Q Any idea?
No.
Q All right. Do you know whether -- how many days of early
voting there was for the 2008 election cycle?
No.
Q Were you ever told that the voters at Shannon County were
only given two days before the primary and two days
before the general?
A I don't remember.
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A You have told me there were 22 a number of times.
Q All right. Other than -- do you have anything to refute that?
A I don't remember what the newspaper story said.
$Q$
Okay. And then how many -- with 22 days, partial days of early voting in Shannon County, what percent of the Shannon County folks voted absentee balloting?
A Four hundred eighty-eight, number of absentee ballots returned.
What percent is that?
18.57 percent.

Q And the rest of the state got how many -- how many days of early voting during the 2010 election cycle?
A The requirement at that time was to begin absentee voting 45 days before the election.
Q So they all received somewhere between 30 and 35 days of actual open courthouse days?
A I wouldn't know for sure, but they were supposed to start 45 days because that is what the law was because we changed it in 2011.
Q In 2011, what was the law change that affected early voting?
A The law change in 2011 regarding absentee voting was changing it from 45 days, which was a Saturday, to -- we changed it to 46 days, which would be a Friday. And then

Q Why didn't you research it for determining whether or not there was a reciprocal relationship between voter turnout and absentee balloting?
A Just never did.
Q Same question for the 2006 election cycle; why didn't you ever look at the number of days where there was an actual location and determine the correlation between early

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hands-on, and that was the McPherson County. And I don't know what I would do where I had to have a Lakota translator. I would have to have a -- the AutomARK that had the Lakota information to make sure that was working, plus the ballots. I am not sure how I would do it.
Q What are the minimum qualifications for the people on-site?
A That is up to the county auditor.
Q What would you consider the minimum qualifications to be?
Are they listed anywhere?
A I don't believe so.
Q All right. So what would you consider the minimum requirements to be for those folks to maintain or work a satellite station in Shannon County?
A Aside from the Lakota language, I don't think it would be
anything different than what they would have at a
courthouse.
Q All right. What are those minimum requirements at a courthouse?
A Whatever the county auditor deems them necessary to hire, those folks.
Q What is your understanding of what most of the county
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Q You have no idea what the minimum requirements are for people that man an election box at a satellite location? A I don't know what the county auditors' determination is on how and why they hire staff.
Q Your only requirement is that one of the workers speak Lakota, and they could handle the box?
A For Shannon County they have to have a Lakota speaker there because of the Voting Rights Act.
Q But it could be any administrative person from the auditor's office that accompanied that particular person?
A It's completely up to the county auditor on what he or she wants.

Q What would you consider as the minimum requirements?
A I'm not sure.
Q All right. What do you think is appropriate pay for those two staff workers to go ahead and man the box?
A No idea.
Q What are the requirements of the location for a satellite office?

Same question for 2010 .
Possibly.
Q Who did you talk to besides your attorney about the problems or how to correct the problems with the lack of

for poll books to go ahead and do absentee balloting?
No.
Q Are poll books mandatory for early voting on election day from 8:00 to 3:00?

A I don't believe so
Q Did you ever research how much notices cost, press releases, KILI radio or something, to go ahead and publicize where the voting location is?

A No, because that is the county auditor's responsibility.
When you give money to the county or distribute the HAVA funds to Shannon County, do you distinguish between early voting expenditures and regular election expenditures?
A It's up to the county auditor to put the information on that reimbursement form. There is nothing --
Q But do you require that the auditor distinguish between early voting in Shannon County and other election

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    Q Are poll books required for going ahead and doing early voting at future elections in Pine Ridge?
A They would have the option during absentee voting if they were going to use it on paper or the computer. I would assume they use it on the computer, but I don't know.

Q When is it mandatory that the folks at any early voting location down at Pine Ridge go ahead and have poll books in place?
A Poll books aren't required during absentee voting. They are required on election day.
Q Why aren't -- why aren't poll books required for absentee balloting?

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(Recess at 3:22 p.m.)
(Deposition Exhibit Numbers 145 and 146 marked for identification.)

Q Have you read this May 7, 2012 letter from O.J. Semans, Four Directions?

Yes.
He wanted you to -- he was asking you to make voting more accessible for Natives by amending the state plan for HAVA.

Yes.
This has been a couple of months ago?
Yes.
Have you done anything to start that amendment process?
My plan was to put this with the file on developing the
new plan, and also seeing how the funding issue was going to develop from the June primary. And with today being
July 9 th, it doesn't appear that Shannon County needed the funds before the election.

Q All right. I think on the second page -- all right. On the third page, it gives you some examples of Native
American communities that would benefit from the addition of a community voting site. Do you know where Wanblee is in Jackson County?
A I'm not sure.

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Do you know where -- you don't know where wanblee is?
I remember hearing of it, but I couldn't point to it on the map.
It's kind of an Indian town in the northeastern corner of Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. No?
I said I recognize the name, but I couldn't point to it in Jackson County.
Norris in Mellette County, and he lists a bunch of counties where there's a heavy Native population -Yes.
-- that would benefit from a community voting site? Yes.
What was your response to this? Did you write this response?
Yes. "I appreciate your suggestion that particular communities may benefit from Vote Centers; however, Vote Centers must be instituted and adopted at a jurisdiction wide basis. For example, in order for Eagle Butte to utilize Vote Centers, Dewey County as a whole must do the same."
Q Where does it say that?
A In my letter of May 23 rd .
Q Right. Where -- did you write this letter? I know you signed it. Did you write it?
A Andrew Pietrus wrote it and I approved it.
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Q All right. So in this letter, what are you -- where are you getting it from that "In order for Eagle Butte to utilize Vote Centers, Dewey County as a whole must do the same"?
A The concept of vote centers is where you don't have to vote at your precinct location. You are able to vote at any location within the county.
Q You talk about the advantages to it; voter accessibility,
reduction of voter fraud?
A Correct.
Q And then you say, "Without the realization of cost
savings, Vote Centers are not practical or feasible"?
A That's correct.
Q All right. You have $\$ 9$ million of HAVA money. Why not put a little bit of that into these Native populations at these different towns?
A Vote centers became -- the first law regarding vote centers was for a sole election in 2011. During the 2012 legislative session, we had a permanent law put in place that allowed any jurisdiction to use vote centers. With the system being so new, we have used it in five elections. Two of them were in Sioux Falls, and then one was in each of Hyde, Potter, and Hand Counties this past June, 2012.

So with the system being so new, there is still a DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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Q Right. But like the five -- the five -- you said there's been five of these voting centers that you have been a part of?
A Yes.
Q Any of those been in Indian Country?
No.
Why not?
Haven't gotten there.
Why not?
A My plan with vote centers and electronic poll books is to move very slowly and very cautiously. It is an amazing system that eliminates that person who goes to the polling place at $6: 55$ and the poll worker says, no, you were supposed to go 30 miles over there. A system that allows us to eliminate that problem is an amazing system.
Right. So why not do it with some Indians?
We have to start slowly so that --
With white people first?
A No. Sioux Falls was the starter of this program. When I was a senator from Sioux Falls, I worked very closely with the Sioux Falls School District. That is where it started. So, of course, it continued in 2012. Then for the 2012 primary, I wanted to use three rural counties. And those three counties requested and were approved to use vote centers.

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Did you ever have any outreach to any heavy Indian populated area regarding potentially using this center? I've thought about this extensively. You've thought about it?
Yes.
Have you -- have you done any outreach to any Indian leader of any of the nine federally recognized Indian tribes in the State of South Dakota regarding a potential voting center?
No.
Why not?
Because we haven't gotten there yet.
Why wouldn't you start with the most impoverished areas first to go ahead and do this rather than going to some -- you know, where you worked for a while?
A These counties, the state isn't paying for the electronic poll books. The counties are paying for it. Sioux Falls went from 58 voting precincts to 10 vote center locations which meant anyone who lived within the boundaries of the Sioux Falls School District could vote at any one of those ten, irregardless of where they lived. In order to do that in Shannon County, there are many more issues that have to be resolved first.
Q Like what?
A Preclearance. The only way to make it cost effective --
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if memory serves, Shannon County has something like seven precinct locations. In order to save money by not having people at those locations, you would have to eliminate them. In order to eliminate some of them, you would have to get preclearance from the Department of Justice.
Q During your tenure as South Dakota's Secretary of State, have you ever met with any tribal leader and discussed increasing Indian voter participation in the State of South Dakota?
A I sent a letter to all tribal presidents asking something about elections, but I don't remember the exact details of the letter. And I have no response.
Q Do you know when it went out?
A I don't remember. During 2011, during the Cheyenne River Reservation election, I went up there and observed. I worked with -- I forget the gentleman's name. He works in the North Dakota office. He showed us some polling places there, and then a couple polling places in South Dakota.
Q Was he on the tribal council or --
A I don't know if he was on the council, but he was in charge of their election. I -- I don't remember his name.
Q Why haven't you done more outreach to Indian Country to increase Indian voter participation? You have got all

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    from them to do anything about it?
Yes.
Why?
Because that was the first time they asked.
Do you remember reading the "Argus Leader" here?
I'm sure I read the article --
All right.
-- six months ago.
Go to the second page. Do you know who Lyla Hutchison
is?
Yes.
Have you ever spoke with her?
Yes.
When did you speak with her?
After the court hearing.
All right. Remember her stating in the article "That was all we could afford. I agree with the voters in the county. As a Commissioner, I don't know what we can do about it." Remember her saying -- reading that in the article?
Yes.
Why didn't you pick up the phone the next day and say, Lyla, here is what you can do about it?
Because it's their responsibility, not mine.
Okay. Then on the last page of the article again, after

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these lawsuits, you have got all this stuff going on regarding equal access to the polling place. Why haven't you done more to go ahead and reach out to Indian leadership?
A I think I can always do better. I can always do more.
Q But you really haven't done anything.
A I sent them a letter. I went and observed the Cheyenne River election.

MR. SANDVEN: Can I have this marked Exhibit 147.
(Deposition Exhibit Number 147 marked for
identification.)
Q Handing you a January 18th "Argus" article, do you remember on the second page of this -- I'm sorry. Did you make the quote on the last page of this exhibit, "It sounds like Shannon County is low on county funds, and they were asking for additional funds, but all counties struggle with their finances"? Do you remember saying that on January 18 th to the "Argus"?
A Yes.
Q So you knew in January -- mid-January of 2012 that Shannon County was -- was struggling with financial issues, and that was the cause of the early voting issues. You knew that?
A Yes.
Q But you waited a month and a half until you got a request
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you made the statement that Shannon County is low on county funds, you talk about Senate Bill 58 that would enable jurisdictions to establish voter -- voting centers, allowing voters to cast their ballots wherever it is easiest?
Yes.
All right. Were you suggesting that that would help Indian Country?
I think it will help all of South Dakota.
Do you think it will help Indian Country?
I think it will help all of South Dakota.
You'll just get the rest of South Dakota done for a
while, and then you will go to Indian Country?
No.
When will you go to Indian Country with this?
Hopefully soon.
What does "soon" mean?
Don't know.
Okay. Then, Mr. Gant, you also -- you read the article where it said, "Participation hurt. In 2004, 15,000 in donations paid for three weeks of early voting...At
57 percent, voter turnout in Shannon County more than doubled compared to the 2000 general..." Did you read that?
A I did now.

Q You just didn't read that part of the article at the time; don't remember?

A Don't remember.
Q Okay. How do you prepare a county for an upcoming election?

A We have election schools that take place during the county auditor conventions, and we provide numerous resources on the website, and any questions or anything that someone would ask.
Q Have you ever went to Indian Country or Indian leadership to try to encourage participation in your conventions so the tribes could go ahead and assist with their early voting on the reservation?
A I think the gentleman in Cheyenne River and I, I think we talked about that.

Q Was he a tribal leader?
A I know -- I do not know the title of his position.
Q You know how tribes work. If I had a problem with elections, I wrote letters to you, you are the boss of elections.
A I do not run tribal elections.
Q No, I didn't suggest that. But why didn't you go to the government leaders regarding elections if you wanted to encourage Indian voter participation?
A The reason for that meeting was to understand how their

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There is three staff, a director, and myself.
All right. Who are the -- who are the three staff again that work primarily with elections?
A Brandon Johnson, Andrew Pietrus, Patrick Baker, and Aaron Lorenzen is the director.
Q Okay. How much of your time is dedicated to the administration of elections, sir?
A I've divided the office in three areas; elections, business services, and then kind of an administrative catchall which is like notaries, concealed weapons, trademarks, that -- if you were to average it out, I suppose it's close to a third, a third, a third.
Q All right. So what is your role with the counties in preparing the counties for county elections? You don't do anything unless they ask?
A No. We always have election schools. I have election schools for cities and schools as well, school districts. How many schools do you put on a year?
It varies. We will visit with the county auditors at every one of their conventions. And I know the city and schools, they have us lined up for three different days in December.
Q You ever done a school on a reservation?
A No. They are usually in Rapid City, Sioux Falls, or Pierre.

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elections work and if there is anything we could learn
from each other, and maybe he could come and visit with us on election day.
Q Right. But that wasn't the leadership of one of the nine tribes.

Last time I ask it. Why don't you just go to the leadership of the nine tribes and say, here, we have got some voting issues. Here is how we work it out. Here is how we can increase voter participation --
A I tried.
Q -- government to government. You wrote a letter?
A I wrote a letter.
Q Never made a call?
A I don't think so.
Q Okay. Have you ever met with the tribal council at Oglala Sioux Tribe?
A No. Just President Steele.
Q Just went to his office?
A No. We met at a building on the east side of Pine Ridge. I forget the name of it.
Q How many of your employees are dedicated towards the Secretary of State's administration of election duties?
A I guess including myself, would be five of us.
Q Who are they besides the four -- the three you mentioned earlier?

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Ever had an Indian show up for one?
I remember there was some -- I remember visiting with a gentleman from Shannon County when we were in Rapid City for that city/school school.
How many of these schools have you put on for elections?
I suppose five in 2011, and probably -- I bet we have only done one so far this year.
Q So out of those six schools, you have attended all of them?
Yes.
How many participants usually show up for the average school?
A Well, they are different. I think we had around 300 city and school districts come at the three different areas. Three hundred people came to one of your trainings?
A Total for those -- for those three for the city and school elections.
okay.
A Then it would be around 60 or 70,80 would be pushing it if there were a number of deputy auditors who would have come to the two auditor conferences.
Q Right. And you remember --
A We also had -- there must have been six in ' 11 because we had a new auditor training because there were a handful of auditors who had just gotten elected. So we wanted to

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do something special for them because they hadn't been an $\mid$ auditor before.

Q So approximately five hundred people have attended your
trainings since you have been Secretary of State?
A Well, 300 plus maybe 80 , so 380 .
Q Three hundred eighty.
A Those 80 came twice.
Q And you remember one Indian coming?
A No. I remember talking about the school district in Shannon County with a gentleman in Rapid City when we had lunch, but I don't remember if he was --
Q Have you ever done any outreach on any of the Indian reservations to go ahead and participate in the trainings?
A Yes.
Q How?
A I went to Cheyenne River.
Q For the -- you met with a Cheyenne River tribal member and asked him?
A I met with the gentleman who was in charge of tribal elections.
Q On the reservation election board, and you invited him to
one of your trainings?
A We went up there and visited, and he drove us around, and
we talked about how we could work together more.
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Q Besides hiring the translator, anything else you did to help out the elections in Shannon County since you have been the Secretary of State?
A On March 2nd I wrote them a letter with additional funds.
Authorized $\$ 12,000$. Anything else?
A A visit with Sara Beth Donovan with the Department of Justice.
Q For preclearance or regarding what?
A What was the issue? Oh. There was a -- my conversations with her aren't private, are they?

MR. WILliAMS: No.
A It was regarding a -- one of the residents of $a$
particular precinct had a restraining order against him from the lady who worked at the precinct location, and there was concern about how that situation was going to be handled.

Q How did that issue come to your office or to you? How did it get to you?
A It may have been from the state's attorney. It could have been the U.S. Attorney, too.
Q So why is that -- why isn't that a legal issue like you considered my complaint to be?
This was --
It's involving a restraining order, right?
-- a day before the election. Either that Friday or
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Q Was there any follow-up on that meeting?
A I'm pretty sure I wrote a thank you note, thanks for taking us around, and he might have bought lunch. I don't remember. He was very nice.
Q Any action ever taken in response to that outreach you
just described?
A Nothing yet.
Q Okay. What counties do you think need the most help in preparing for an election?
A Counties with new auditors.
Q How about Shannon and Todd?
A Their election is run by two auditors who have been there for many, many years. They clearly know how to run an election.
Q Since you have been South Dakota's Secretary of State, have you ever went ahead and done anything to help prepare Shannon County for an election?
A Indirectly.
Q How?
A Through hiring the Lakota translator.
Q And you provided the funding or you did the actual hiring yourself, your office?
A We hired the Lakota translator.
Q Out of Pierre?
A I don't remember where she is from.
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Monday before the Tuesday election.
Q So if it's -- you consider it to be a legal or -- legal issue or an issue for your discretion based upon the proximity to the election date?
A They called to let me know -- since I became Secretary, a number of conversations with Sara Beth Donovan with the Department of Justice to begin a relationship so that when she is in the state or when her election observers are here, that we have an open line of communication to talk to each other and, if the need arises, to help each other out.
Q All right. So during this recent election cycle, who did you help out? Who did you spend your most time with working, which counties?
A Oh, it would have been Hyde, Potter, and Sully. No. Hyde, Potter and, yeah, Sully.
Q What did you do to help them out, sir?
A We were assisting them in running their electronic poll books and vote center.
Q All right. So you sent your staff over to those particular counties to go ahead and assist or you provided telephonic assistance or --
A Staff and myself.
Q You went over there on-site to help out?
A Uh-huh.

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Q What is your reaction now?
A I'm very happy that we have solved -- a solution for 2012.

Q Did Pat Powers have any role in HAVA?
A No.
Q All right. He was the director of something for you, right?
A When I mentioned before that I had three areas in my office, he oversaw the administrative part.
Q Not a doggone thing to do with elections?
A Everyone in the office touches elections. I mean my secretary answers the phone, and it's elections, it's auditors who call. If the lines upstairs are busy, then the basement receives election phone calls. If we are going through petitions or we are going through election day, it's all hands on deck.
Q Okay. So what -- what are his roles -- what is his role
or what was his role with elections? What did he do?
A Not much aside from when we received petitions from
candidates, he would Tweet and Facebook those, and he
helped with IT on election night reporting. We moved to
a cloud based server system, and he helped with that
process.
Q He is kind of a techie guy?
A Uh-huh. Yes.
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state HAVA plan?

A No. I mean the Secretary of State's office and the tribe working together on economic development, which most everyone agrees with, that that would be a step to move us to where maybe there is other opportunities that we could have to work together.
Q Right. But for the South Dakota Secretary of State and your 15 employees and your resources, you know, your skill set, why not focus on getting the voting stuff taken care of at Shannon County before economic development?
A I don't know. We just decided to start with business. That was our -- my big focus on the first six months in office, and it just seemed like a logical step because we are developing this system, why not plan for the future, and why not begin those discussions.
Q Do you think the State of South Dakota has a history of limiting voting opportunities to Shannon County
residents?
A I don't know.
No opinion?
No.
Mr. Gant, are you aware of the case Bone Shirt versus
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Hazeltine? Have you ever read that?
A Vaguely familiar. I don't believe I have read the whole thing.
Do you agree with the outcome?
I don't know what it was.
Q Do you think that the State of South Dakota has a history of limiting political participation of Shannon County residents?
I don't know.
No opinion?
No opinion.
Q Do you think -- do you believe there is tension between non-Indians and Native American communities in South Dakota in the border towns around these reservations?
A As I mentioned before, it seems like there is news stories about confusion over federal jurisdiction versus state jurisdiction and those issues.
Q You talked about the causes of the tension you believe to be the criminal jurisdiction issues between law enforcement and some of the criminal machinery?
A I think that's part of it.
Anything else?
No.
Q Do you think that tension between white and Native Americans in Shannon County impacts the voting behavior
or impacts voting in Shannon County, the bad relationships?
A I don't know. I don't know what the voter turnout was in the last tribal election.
Q Are you familiar with the concept of border towns, how some of the racial tensions are more severe in the border towns around the reservation, any experience there?
A I grew up in Geddes. We were right next to the Yankton Sioux Tribe. So I don't know. I don't know the definition of border town.
Q Do you think the race relations maybe around Yankton are
a little better than out at Pine Ridge between some of the border towns?
A I really couldn't answer that.
Q Do other states use these voting centers?
A Yes.
Q Most states?
A No.
Q How many states?
A We've yet to find one state that does it exactly like we do it. But I know it was started in Colorado maybe ten years ago.
Q What was -- when was the year that you first got them going in South Dakota?
A The legislation was passed during the 2010 legislative
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resources on election day to help pay for the $\$ 2,000$ per unit.
Q That is what the other five counties did that you worked with?
Yes.
How much money did you have in each one of those pilots -- or how much did they have into it?
A Sioux Falls, I believe the electronic poll books cost around 30,000.
Q For one? Are they 10,000 apiece and you get three?
A They are $\$ 2,000$ a piece.
Q So Sioux Falls needed 15?
A The $\$ 2,000$ is what it would have cost us to buy 250 right now. I don't remember the exact dollar figure for sioux Falls in 2011. I think the total expense was something like 30,000. Sioux Falls was different because they use their own computers.
Q There's computers and internet and all that stuff down in Shannon County, too, right?
A I do not know if there is internet access.
Q Of course there is. It's at all the district centers and you have got internet providers, you know, right there in Pine Ridge. Have you ever researched all the internet capabilities and how they could do that down there?
A Not at all.
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Q Why not, sir?
Because there was no reason.
But have you ever talked with anyone at U.S. DOJ about getting preclearance, you know, to go ahead and do this, this project down there?
A I talked with Sara Beth Donovan about it.
And --
We both had the same concerns, about closing the other sites and paying for it.
Q And this requirement that you close other sites, this is purely feasibility or --
A It is not a requirement. But you need to -- you need to justify to the taxpayers why you're spending this money. And if you can spend $\$ 10,000$ and show you saved $\$ 12,000$, well, then the taxpayer saved 2,000 bucks, so that is a good deal.
Q Understood. But couldn't some of the HAVA money be utilized for voting centers down there? Go to the checklist. Wouldn't it fit into one of those 17 items?
A There is a lot to do with Shannon County before we can get that far. We -- apparently 2012 was the first time they had a successful election. So let's go from there. Let's build upon what we have.
Q Okay. What infrastructure do you need in place to do a voting center or implement the program down in Shannon

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County because you could use all this HAVA money, right, to fund the equipment and all this other -- all the infrastructure? You have got a staff of 15.3 people, that you could allocate a person or two. What do you need from the tribe to go ahead and implement this or what do you need from the folks to implement this or what do you need from the commission to implement this?
A There would be a whole laundry list of items.
Q Right. But you went through it five times already.
And Shannon County is different. They would have to do everything that the other counties did, but then --
Plus preclearance?
Plus preclearance.
What else?
Figuring out if it's the right thing to do, of closing some of those locations.
Q But that is not a mandatory requirement to close if you use HAVA money to supplement?
A But you need to show that you are going to save money.
Q Why? Why do you have to save money to set up voting
centers? Why can't it just be increasing Indian voter participation and some of the HAVA money absorbs that? A Because I'm not focused on a particular racial group. I focus on all of South Dakota to make sure we move all of South Dakota forward. I don't think we should treat DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY 605-338-8898

I was not Secretary on January 1.
Did you and Chris Nelson do a turnover or anything when you assumed office and he left office regarding anything to do with HAVA?
Yes. We had a transition period.
Right. Did you ever have a discussion regarding this $\$ 10,000$ allocation with all the counties?
Not on that, no.
Did you ever have any discussions with your predecessor regarding some of the voting issues in Shannon County or Todd County?
I don't remember.
Did you ever have any discussions with him regarding voting rights litigation of any kind?
I don't remember.
Okay. It's no secret, there's voting issues, voting litigations in that corner of the state. No discussions with Chris Nelson regarding that?
A I don't remember.
Q Can you think of any other examples besides that -- it was $\$ 660,000$ that was distributed to the counties without reimbursement. Any other examples you can think of?
A The only reason I remember that is because it happened right before I was sworn in.
Q Was there any description of what that money was supposed

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to be used for?
A I'm sure there was a letter with it, but I don't
remember.
Have you read the letter?
Yep.
What did it say?
I don't remember.
Remember anything it said about what the money was
supposed to be used for?
No.
Did that HAVA distribution comply with the state HAVA
plan?
I assume so.
Why didn't reimbursement apply to those funds?

all those counties went ahead and used it up?
A I do not know.
Q Do you know if most of them have?

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to the state auditor or -- and they say, okay.
A Ultimately everything is my responsibility in that office.

Q Right. So you approved the expenditure of $\$ 660,000$ of HAVA funds --

-- without receipts?
No.
Explain.
That is not what I said.

A I don't think we have received a Shannon County
reimbursement form since $I$ have been in office.
Q Okay. It's your testimony that Shannon County hasn't
submitted a reimbursement form to you since you were
seated as South Dakota Secretary of State?
A I don't think they submitted anything in '11, and I know
they haven't since June of ' 12 .
Q I don't understand. If they are so hard up for money, why wouldn't they be asking you for money?

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Q -- since the State of South Dakota started receiving HAVA funds?

I'm not sure.
You don't know of any others?
I'm not sure.
Did you share any of your concerns about those monies, that $\$ 660,000$, getting misappropriated?
I never said I had concerns about that money being misappropriated.
Q No. I'm asking if you did. Have you ever stated you have concerns or had concerns?
A I would not have concerns about that money because they can only spend it with reimbursement forms.
Q okay. So why don't you do that with Shannon County? Why don't you go ahead and say, Shannon County, here is $\$ 50,000$ to cover the cost of early voting for this entire election cycle. Don't spend it until you go ahead and submit your reimbursement form. Why can't you do that for 2012 and future elections?
A Because there is a chance that money will be spent without receipts.
Q Now I'm really confused because I thought there were some counties that didn't have to submit receipts, others that did.
A You asked me about Shannon County.

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$\$ 660,000$, go ahead and send that to the respective -- the $\mid$ 66 county accounts?
A No. No. It went into their county account of their available expenditures.
Q You just increase the line item from each one of these folks \$10,000?
A They each received an additional $\$ 10,000$. This letter, December 30, 2011, where I say that Shannon County has $\$ 68,000$ available, if they didn't request any reimbursement in all of 2011, their ending balance on December 31, 2010 -- I don't know about interest and that kind of stuff -- but it would have been $\$ 58,910.78$. So they were granted an additional $\$ 10,000$ in expenditure, I guess, authority, so to speak.
Q All right. So in your HAVA account do you have any individual sub-accounts for each one of the counties?
A Absolutely.
Q And each one of those sub-accounts accrues interest?
A Yes.
Q All right. So these numbers that I'm seeing, you know,
the amount of money that the State of South Dakota has
received --
A Oh, yes.
Q -- you go ahead and you apportion that between counties?
A Yes.
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Q All right. Do you understand how the initial distribution of HAVA was done? Why -- do you understand why a certain amount was distributed to a certain county in each one of those sub-accounts? I know this is long before you became Secretary of state. But if that money was coming in since 2003, do you understand how it started out because it sounds like to me that you went ahead and just did everything proportionally after you -after you took office. Correct? Whatever the past practice was, you continued it, correct?
A No. You are tying two different things together.
Explain it to me, sir.
A The interest, speaking of interest, it has to be by each account and what their dollar amount is.
Q All right. So now that we have got interest away, I want to talk about principal. Do you understand the criteria before you came in for determining what the principal amount was that was initially placed in each one of these counties' accounts?

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Q All right. Do you know if there is anything in the existing HAVA plan, the one that is in effect, that says how much each county gets?
A I don't remember.
Q Don't know?
A Don't remember.
Q Does the Secretary of State's office monitor and track
that account during the year?
A Which account?
Q The HAVA account.
A Yes.
Q All right. So in the HAVA account, are there 66 sub-accounts?
A Yes.
Q Are there any other sub-accounts besides the sub-account for each county?
A They are broken out into the different titles and sections. This title can go this way and this title can go this way.
Q So your understanding is -- how many -- so each county
has one or two accounts?
A I don't remember how many they have.
Q How often does your office track that account?
A How often --
Q Do you post those accounts?
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Q How much money does the county have to contribute to the HAVA account? Is it five percent?

I believe so.
Five percent of what?
Of the new money that they are receiving.
All right.
I believe it's a 95 to 5 match.
Right. So is there a limit on how much Shannon County can match with the 5/95 formula?
A As the example of the 2012 having $\$ 6,000$ available, that is for the whole state. So even if we did it equally, we would each have $\$ 88$ or whatever. So then the county would have to come up with a dollar, and then $\$ 88$.
Q On some of the real good years with HAVA -- let's say it's a five million dollar year, all right? So could Shannon County -- that's a pretty good deal. I put in five bucks, and I get a hundred to spend on elections, right?
A That would depend upon the state plan in place at that time. Remember, you can't accept the HAVA money from the feds until you have a state plan in place.
Q Right. But if the state plan is in place --
A No. Like today I cannot accept the $\$ 6,000$.
Q Right. But if -- but the distribution from prior years, was there a limit on what Shannon County could go ahead

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A Post them?
Q Are they public? Are they subject to the open records law?

Q This reimbursement practice or plan that South Dakota requires since the administration of HAVA funds in '03 -Okay.
Q -- are we the only state that does that?
I don't think so.
Do you know of another state that requires reimbursement
like the State of South Dakota before administering these funds?
A I can't name a state off the top of my head, no.
Q We have never had a problem with HAVA expenditures that you know about?
A Yeah. I haven't heard about anything from '03 to '10.
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not transfer it over?
A A number of reasons. One, you have asked me probably a hundred times how much does it cost for absentee voting in Shannon County. And I have told you I don't know.
Q And you have never investigated it?
A No. And Shannon County has said they believe they need an extra $\$ 12,000$. So we don't even know if that number is right. They may only submit reimbursement for 8,000 . So if that's the case -- as I have said before, if we want to sit down and put together some sort of agreement for the future, I've said I am open to that.

MR. SANDVEN: Okay. I need five minutes. We might be close to wrapping up.
(Recess at 4:48 p.m.)
BY MR. SANDVEN:
Q Why do you only pay out the HAVA funds twice a year?
A That's how the 2010 plan states it.
Q Do you have any opposition to changing it? Doesn't it make more sense to do it on a need-based basis?
A I completely agree. I want to do it when the counties submit their reimbursement form. But that is one of the changes I want to make to the plan.
Q What else do you want to change?
A There was something else with this lawsuit, but I can't remember.

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But --
Q So why do we need a reimbursement plan if there has never been a problem?
A We need a reimbursement plan to make sure that we can account for every federal dollar that we spend.
That's your requirement, not HAVA's requirement?
That is the 2010 state HAVA plan requirement.
And you don't want that requirement changed in the plan?
I do not.
Why?
Because I just said, we want to make sure that we know where every federal dollar -- that every federal dollar that is spent is tied to a receipt.
Q But you can't cite a single reason -- you can't cite a single example of any wrongdoing with HAVA funds?
A No.
MR. SANDVEN: Nothing further.
EXAMINATION BY MS. FRANKENSTEIN:
Q Secretary Gant, I have a few questions for you. The approximately $\$ 68,000$ that is in Shannon County's HAVA account right now, that is not to be spent only for any particular year, is that correct?
That's correct.
So that is something that could decrease to zero? Yes.

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Q And whether or not it decreases to zero without replenishment, is that an issue for Congress as to whether or not they will refund HAVA disbursements?

A Yes, it is.
Q What happens if Shannon County spends all of its money and it has zero, but HAVA is still in place requiring what it does, which costs money?

A That would be up to the legislature and the governor.
Q Could you transfer money from the state HAVA fund into Shannon County's HAVA fund should it decrease to zero?
A I would have to review the plan again, but $I$ don't believe so.

Q You don't believe the state fund could replenish Shannon's funds?

A No. The state -- just like I'm doing with the March 2nd letter, it would be that type of situation, if we were in that type of situation.

Q So should Shannon County's HAVA account decrease to something low or zero, Shannon County could request from you for a transfer of money from the state HAVA account to Shannon County's HAVA account?

A They could request it, but, again, it's not normal because we are treating a county differently, and that will have numerous concerns from other counties.

Q You don't know whether, because it was before you took

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No.
Q Is there any requirement or guideline that you know of at all that states how each county -- how, where or how often each county provides early voting as far as hours, location, days of the week, et cetera?

A I'm not aware of any law that details that. In your opinion, who determines that?

The county auditor or the county commission.
We had quite a bit of discussion how Shannon County residents would have to drive to Hot Springs to vote. I'm going to represent that that discussion could only have been relevant to times prior to 2012 because we have got 46 days of early voting in Shannon County. Do you agree?

A Absolutely.
Q So in all that testimony where we talked about driving to Hot Springs for Shannon County residents to vote, could any of those Shannon County residents prior to 2012 have requested and voted absentee by mail?
Yes.
And that's not the only way to vote, by mail or absentee;
there is also election day, correct?
Yes.
Q And election day has polling places that are close by the voter. Is that true?

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office, whether the previous administration considered
the cost for Lakota translators in its distribution
policy when funding each individual county's HAVA account?
A I don't know that.
Q Is that something that you would consider should you have the opportunity in the future to disburse HAVA funds?
A Yeah. It's something to consider.
Q Earlier today there was some discussion about the state statute which indicates something close to the effect as follows: Absentee voting shall begin no earlier and no later than 46 days prior to the election. Do you recall that --
A Yes.
Q -- statute? Is there anything in addition to that in the state laws or administrative regulations that you know of that require counties to have early voting open on certain days of the week?
A No.
Q How about certain hours of the day?
A No.
Q How about in certain locations?
A No.
Q How about how many locations will be open within a county?

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Much closer.
In fact, the idea of precincts is to have a polling
location close to your residence?
Yes, in your neighborhood.
So prior to 2012, regardless of whether Shannon County
had zero days or 22 days of early voting on location in a satellite office within Shannon County, those residents still had the opportunity to absentee vote by mail, absentee vote in a location in Shannon County for whatever limited time period was allowed, or vote on election day. Is that true?
A Yes, with the one concern about when the no excuse absentee legislation was changed.
Q There was a question or two regarding where people can register to vote. I recall the question being with regard to if an early voting site is only open two days prior to the election, that person can't register to vote also during that time. Do you recall?

- Yes.

Where all could people within Shannon County register to vote?
A There would be a great number of places. They could get a voter registration form from the Secretary of State's website. They should -- there should be voter registration applications at numerous government entities DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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that are located in their community. Or they could get a voter registration application from the county auditor. I suppose they could also request one if they didn't have internet, and I would assume the auditor would mail it to
them, but --
Q So as far as you know, there have always been many
options as far as where Shannon County residents can go to register to vote within the geographic boundaries of Shannon County?

A Yes.
Q Are you familiar with the Lakota coordinator office that
also keeps office hours within the geographic boundaries of Shannon County?
A I remember hearing about that.
Q And do you know whether she can also take voter
registration cards and register voters?
A I think I remember hearing that she could, but I could be wrong.
Q If Shannon County did absentee voting at a satellite office -- so, for instance, in Pine Ridge, not at the Fall River County Courthouse -- on election day without any electronic poll book, how would anyone know if the same person voted absentee and then voted at his or her regular polling place on election day? Voted twice essentially.

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Q Any other expenses that Shannon County should anticipate, should it get preclearance, and work on any Department of Justice issues with its memorandum of understanding before voting centers are created within its county?
A The options we discussed today were just those that came off the top of my head. There would need to be in-depth discussions, considerable education of the public. Any time a polling location is closed or it's moved, it causes great confusion, and there is the need to make sure that you educate as much as possible so the people aren't confused.

The tradeoff with vote centers is that you tell people they can vote anywhere, which helps alleviate some of the concerns. Well, I used to vote at this place, but now I guess I can vote anywhere.
Q We had some discussion earlier today about the 2010 HAVA plan, state plan, which is currently in effect which allows for reimbursement twice a year. And you had indicated you were open to or in fact wanted to allow for more reimbursement per year.
That is correct.
Could it be that you have not received Shannon County's reimbursement request yet because they want to make sure they know of and compile all expenses and all invoices to attach to it because they know they only get two

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reimbursement time periods within 2012?
Yes.
And should the HAVA plan, state plan, be changed in the future to allow for more reimbursement requests throughout the year, perhaps a county could expend money for an expense and immediately seek reimbursement before all their bills come in for that election?
A That will be the problem that we will have to discuss once a task force is put together, is how many times counties are going to be able to submit. Trying to do a favorable outcome in the Shannon County situation could turn out to be detrimental when I have another county that submits one dollar reimbursement sheets a thousand times. That will be a lot of paperwork and a lot of administrative cost.
Q You indicated earlier that you were not certain what criteria was used by your predecessor in the initial HAVA task force to initially distribute HAVA funds to each South Dakota county's account. Who would be the best person to speak to about that criteria used at that time?
A It would be my predecessor, Secretary Chris Nelson.
Q Could your office buy counties electronic poll books directly?
Yes.
Q Could that expense come out of the state HAVA fund or DAKOTAH REPORTING AGENCY

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would that have to be allocated and paid for out of each county's HAVA account?
A How I did the process with the 2011 Sioux Falls election was state HAVA paid for the system, Sioux Falls used it, and then Sioux Falls used it again. And then when they want to use it for 2013, it will -- they will have to buy or use the Minnehaha system.
Q I'm not sure I understand that.
A We are using two different systems. Sioux Falls used a vendor called ES\&S, and Hyde, Potter and Sully used a vendor called Hart. The second time we used ES\&S, I wasn't happy and the election officials in Sioux Falls weren't happy with what -- we thought the issues that we had in the first election would have been resolved by the second election, and they weren't.

So we began a nationwide search to find a new vendor, and we found that vendor in Hart InterCivic. And that is the company we used in those three rural counties, and will be the system we will use in Sioux Falls, assuming they want to do it again in 2013.
Q This vendor, is this some kind of software or is this hardware?
A Both.
Q So the software, is there any additional licensing
payments or anything to expand the use to other counties?

A That's the big question because money is needed. As I mentioned before with Sioux Falls going from whatever it was, 58 locations to 10 locations, that is where they had a considerable savings. I don't know if eliminating this location or that location in Shannon County is going to, one, help preclearance and, two, be a good idea in the county, even if they are approved for it, if the residents of one of the other locations -- I mean obviously they are going to have one in Pine Ridge, but like if they decide not to have a polling location in Kyle, I don't know if that's the best course of action for Shannon County. Obviously they are going to have to figure that out. But --
Q So in the end, I note the reimbursement hasn't taken place yet, but these three counties will end up reimbursing the state. So in the end, HAVA didn't cover the expenses for those three counties?
A It will come out of their county HAVA accounts.

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    A Yes. It's -- I want to say it's $\$ 75$ per year per unit. For the software?

Yes.
okay.
It comes with a laptop, the software, a scan gun, a
signature pad, and a receipt printer.
Q So I'm not clear on what part of that was paid through the state HAVA plan and what part was paid through the counties. That is what I don't understand.
A The state paid for both systems. And the three counties, Hyde, Potter, Sully, are going to reimburse the state out of their county HAVA account to purchase those units.
Q The hardware?
A The whole shebang.
Q okay.
A So whatever the state cost was, it will then be divided
by -- oh, each county up there had a different number of poll books that they used. I think one had five, one had seven, one had nine. So they won't pay equal. They will pay whatever their proportion is. However many machines they have.
Q In the end the counties anyway that used the new polling center paid a hundred percent of the bill to use the new software and hardware?
A They haven't purchased it yet. The state paid for it a
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So the reimbursement you are talking about is from the three counties' HAVA accounts to the state HAVA account? Yes.
okay.
There is no actual cash that Hyde County is sending to the state. It's a purchase that way.
Q Your concern is the Shannon County HAVA account may not have enough money to pay for the cost because it may not realize --
A That is one of the many concerns. I have had one election where I have been Secretary of State. And it went relatively well. There was extremely low turnout, but the issues that have been brought up didn't appear to happen. We had 46 days, so everything seemed to go well.

MS. FRANKENSTEIN: I believe that is all the questions I have for you. Thank you.

MR. WILLIAMS: I have nothing.
FURTHER EXAMINATION BY MR. SANDVEN:
Q A couple more. On the $\$ 12,000$ you authorized on March 2nd, that request was made on March 1st. Correct?
A Yes. I believe I received that by e-mail or fax on March 1st.
Q Right. It was your discretion, you could approve that all by yourself?
A Based off of the state HAVA plan and the HAVA Act.
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605-338-8898 didn't ask for more money.
Q Right. But I thought I just heard you say that you wouldn't want to transfer a large amount from the HAVA money, that the money that's not allocated currently, you wouldn't want to transfer and replenish their account up to a hundred or $\$ 2000$-- $\$ 200,000$ because you're worried about what other counties would respond with?
A The ability for the $\$ 12,000$ based off their information received that that was an understandable need, and it may not even be the exact number. I mean they may only ask for reimbursement for $\$ 11,000$. We don't know what the -what the amount is.

Q Right. But it's your discretion on how much is
transferred or how much is preapproved? You did it all by yourself; you didn't have to go to anybody else?
A Correct.
Q All right. Then there is no limit for you in the HAVA plan on what amount you go ahead and transfer or do the same a month from now?
A I can't think of any requirement.
Q It's totally your discretion on how much money is transferred to the Shannon County account or preapproved for early voting?
A They asked for the 12,000 , and I approved it.
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Q So whatever amount they asked from you, it's your
discretion on whether to approve it or not approve it?
A If they would have asked for six million, that would have been a lot of red flags.
Q Could they ask for a hundred thousand?
A We don't even know how much the 2012 primary is costing.
Right.
A I mean I think as soon as we know, that is going to be a much better picture.
Q Right. But whatever requests they make for money to transfer over is the sole discretion of South Dakota Secretary of State Gant?
A Based off of the HAVA plan and the HAVA Act.
Q And you will exercise your discretion based upon those principles --
Yes.
-- in the plan and act?
Yes.
All right. Talked a little bit about polling places, E-Books.
Yes.
Q There's no greater chance of greater fraud or someone voting twice on election day in Shannon County than
anyplace else, is there?
A It would be the same.
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Q Right. No greater risk in Shannon County than anyplace else?
A In the 2012 election, the Shannon County -- there wasn't a difference between Shannon County and any other county.
Q Right. So the questions that Attorney Frankenstein just asked you, we have got to worry about election fraud on election day from 8:00 to 3:00, that someone could vote over here, over here, she talked about risk there, right?

A Yes. I believe I said that's the same risk we have all across South Dakota.
No different in Shannon County than anyplace else?
No, sir.
Q And you don't know of a single incident since you have been South Dakota Secretary of State where someone voted twice at Pine Ridge?
A No.
MR. SANDVEN: No further questions.
MR. WILLIAMS: I have nothing.
MS. FRANKENSTEIN: I have one.
FURTHER EXAMINATION BY MS. FRANKENSTEIN:
Q Back to the absentee voting location in the satellite office, assuming that satellite office is in Pine Ridge and they have no computer there, so they don't have access directly to the Shannon County voter registry --
A Okay.
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Q -- and that satellite office is doing absentee voting on election day up to 3:00, that office wouldn't be like every other county office because every other county office presumably does it at their county courthouse where they have access to their computerized voter registry. Is that true?
A You are talking on election day?
Q Election day early voting.
A On election day, if you -- you have a Pine Ridge location
and then another location is your scenario?
Q Somebody could absentee vote in Hot Springs at --
A Oh, yes.
Q -- their county courthouse, absentee on election day, and vote at the satellite location in Pine Ridge on election day absentee?
A That would be the same thing like voting in Sioux Falls and then trying to go vote in Dell Rapids. You are still in Minnehaha County. Yeah. But you can't do that because the auditor is to notify that precinct location where that person resides so that they don't vote twice. Electronic poll books are a completely different story.
Q Because then no phone call needs to be made?
A Correct. All the computers are linked together.
Q Mr. Sandven's questions regarding Shannon County having a satellite office would be just the same as any other

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Correct.
Q -- that auditor should call up the regular polling place of that voter and say, by the way, someone voted here absentee in the polling place, cross them off your physical list?

Yes.
okay.
Sorry.
Telephone service or cell phones would be required to make sure that protocol is available?
A Yes. Some sort of communication from the county auditor or the auditor's office to that location. It's the same story anywhere. Shannon isn't special in that regard. I mean Harding County is even denser and there's, you know --

MS. FRANKENSTEIN: That's all the questions I have. FURTHER EXAMINATION BY MR. SANDVEN:
Q Real quick. No greater risk in Shannon County than anywhere else in the state of voter fraud on election day?
A It would all be the same based off those scenarios because the -- the law is the same. Everyone gets to vote until 3:00 o'clock. Pine Ridge in essence on June 5th, 2012 was just like Sioux Falls.
Q Yep. You have the same safeguards on Pine Ridge that you

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county, that wouldn't be necessarily true except maybe Pennington County with the satellite early voting center in Wall.
A I guess I'm confused because when you say "satellite location," are you talking about Pine Ridge being a satellite location?

Q Right. Correct.
A Or Kyle being a --
Q Well, let's take 2012 where it was Pine Ridge where Shannon County had a satellite location. So on election day somebody could absentee vote at the Shannon County courthouse, which is in Hot springs, or they could vote at the Shannon County satellite office in Pine Ridge, or they could vote at their regular precinct polling place. A That is correct, up until 3:00 o'clock.
Q Right. So the -- because -- or if the satellite office
in Pine Ridge doesn't have any electronic poll book, the only prevention against a voter fraudulently voting in more than one location is a telephone call?
A Which is the exact same procedure for the rest of the state. There is nothing special about your scenario that makes Shannon different than any other county.
Q Okay. So if in another county somebody absentee votes at the courthouse, which isn't their regular polling place --
have anywhere else against this. All you need is a cell phone; is that what I heard?
A The same safeguards. You have two different auditors running each of those elections.
Q Right. But what I'm getting at is that -- I'm listening to all these hypotheticals that maybe there is some mischievous Indian that runs here and here and here, and does this duplicate voting, all right? Is there any additional risk at Pine Ridge of that happening than anywhere else in this state?
A The only difference is that it's not the true auditor's office because it's a different location. But otherwise, no, everything is just like Minnehaha.
Q As long as there is some kind of communication that works between that satellite office and the auditors, you are fine, right?
A Which I assume they have been doing for years and years.
Q They have cell phones and electricity and all that stuff
like anywhere else, right?
A Yes.
MR. SANDVEN: No further questions.
